Curate's Reflection

This is a picture of a labyrinth prayer cushion I love to use whenever I visit the Diocese House of Retreat in Pleshey. I find it a wonderful way to pray.

The labyrinth is like a maze but with a big difference, a labyrinth does not set out to



challenge or frustrate us with dead-ends. Labyrinths have one uninterrupted route to the centre, a continuous flow representing a spiritual journey.

Labyrinths are familiar in all cultures but have been an important part of the Christian faith since the fourth century. Thousands of labyrinths are registered with the Worldwide Labyrinth Locator, with over 200 listed in England. They can be found on hospital grounds, museums, and public gardens, offering people the chance to contemplate and quieten the mind. In the Dengie, one is mown into grass in the grounds of the Othona Community at Bradwell-on-Sea. A little further afield, one can be found in the central grass area of the Norwich Cathedral cloisters, commemorating the late Queen Elizabeth II's golden jubilee.

Journeying to the centre of a labyrinth is a pilgrimage. It invites us to slow down, focus our minds, and notice things that God may point out to us as we move to the centre. It helps us engage our body and mind and do some soul-searching. Quietly tracing a finger around a labyrinth or physically walking around one outdoors can be a powerful way to ask God to help us resolve problems, cope with grief, release a fear, seek forgiveness or just be with God in a deeply personal way. When we arrive at the centre, we spend time being open and receiving God's love and dwelling with God before returning along the route with fresh insights through what God has revealed. As we journey back to the entrance, we pick up our life with the perspective God has revealed and blessed us with.

The exciting thing is that this summer, we are cutting a labyrinth in St Leonard's churchyard. Everyone is invited to visit the labyrinth, enjoy a period of reflection, think through things that concern us, thank God for something, or just spend time being quiet and basking in the serene peace only God provides. A labyrinth can help us experience the affirming and gentle guiding hand of God, who, even when we may feel lost or confused, is always leading us onwards.

If you can't make it to the churchyard, here is a picture labyrinth to use as described above: pray and dwell with



our God, who is always listening.

'Ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. ⁸ For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened.

A RAINY DAY

I expect many of you have heard the expression "You'd better put aside a little money for a rainy day." It was meant to encourage us to set aside money for the future or if any unseen financial or health crisis occurs. A rainy day though often conjures up visions of future difficult times, cloudy skies, dampened prospects but it isn't always necessarily

Many people want to save so that they can leave a good inheritance for their children and I read recently that one of the latest ideas is 'Forget about the children's inheritance, let's go skiing!!" "Skiing" to my amusement means let's go 'Spend the Kids' Inheritance.'!! Not sure the inheritors will like this though!!

I read that a "rainy day fund" means that we should have at least 3 months' worth of essential outgoings in our accounts as an emergency fund. This is ok for some but almost impossible for many who find it difficult to live day to day let alone save.

Matthew 6: 19-20 says: "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth where moths and vermin destroy for where your treasure is there your heart is also." I sense in this Scripture that God doesn't say that we can't have savings, in fact if we are able, it's sensible to put some by for a "Rainy Day." I sense God is saying that if we see a person in need and we have more than enough for ourselves it is good to help them, to invest in people, rather than invest and store up money that can be used for good now. As Christians we often say in Church, when giving thanks for our financial giving, "All things come from You (our God) and of your own do we give You". Hebrews 13:16 says "And do not forget to do good and to share with others, for with such sacrifices God is pleased". God gives to us and reminds us that sharing isn't just about finance but also our time and our talents. Let's use what we can offer to make someone else's rainy day a little bit brighter.

In 1851 George Sumner became Rector of Old Alresford, Near Winchester. His wife, Mary (1858-1921), gave him three children. When her daughter became a mother, Mary remembered her own difficulties as a new mother and held support meetings of mothers in her parish. These grew to become the Commonwealth-wide Mothers' Union. Her personal prayer is preserved in Old Alresford Rectory. It's worth using, especially when faith sharing seems daunting.

Sharing Pastoral Care

Jenny and Brenda recently went along to a Pastoral Carers training morning in Chelmsford aimed at gaining insights into setting up Effective Pastoral Care Teams in a Parish. The session was facilitated by: Andy Griffiths and Jane Richards from the Chelmsford Diocese. We, at St. Leonard's, are exploring ways of being more effective in our pastoral care.

Years ago, the majority of Pastoral Care was done by the Vicar of the Parish who usually only had one church to oversee. Most Vicars today have the care and oversight of up to 3 or more churches; this makes it almost impossible for them to have the time to carry out the vast amount of care needed within the church congregations and the surrounding parishes, as well as carrying out all their other pastoral duties which contrary to popular belief Vicars certainly do not only work on Sundays!!

During the training morning, we looked at a model for a Pastoral Care Team and discussed in small groups what we already had in place in our own churches and how we could continue to build up our existing teams. We were really encouraged from our discussions to see that in our churches of Southminster and Steeple we are already very active in our Pastoral Care ministries and hope to develop and encourage others in our congregations to take on roles within the teams in a however large or small capacity. As with any team formed it's important to have a leader or shared leadership to oversee and make sure care needs are met in an appropriate way, be they spiritual or practical, always understanding the boundaries to be aware of in any situation. One of the boundaries Andy spoke of was, if possible, when recognising a need is to not only give assisted help but also to encourage self-help as well. This may be short term or longer. Andy shared the quote: "Never do for others what they can do for themselves." which recognises the importance of people keeping their independence as much as they are able and for the carer to be wise in their caregiving.

Pastoral Care is recognising a need and acting on it appropriately and also, if necessary, passing on a person needing help to someone more knowledgeable in a specific area. Pastoral care is giving time to visit or phone someone as well as recognising the ongoing need for contributions to the local food pantry or hospital or care home visits. Above all, good communication is the key to effective networking so as many needs are met as possible.

May we, as churches, continue to develop our pastoral care, always relying on our Lord's help for compassion, grace and wisdom and His Godly strength in all we do.

There is a certain comfort in knowing that others have suffered the same unhappiness that a bereavement brings and hope that by being with others who understand, you may find a way to cope, day to day, with your loss.
