If Steve takes this on, it will be his first in a completely different writing system—the Ethiopic script.

We have recovered from our "adventures" with Jesse; he continues to be kept in custody until his trial. No date has been set. Meanwhile Johanna has worked hard, with the help of a local carpenter/painter, to get the cottage refurbished in time for Stephen and Mel.

## **Pathways**

As we begin a New Year it's always good to look afresh at our direction in life and do we feel we are on the right pathway in our walk with the Lord and in our work for Him.

**Creation led** – experiencing an ability to connect with God through nature.

We need to understand our own pathway and the unique way our God created us. I love the expression from Isaiah 30 v 21 which says: "Whether you turn to the right or to the left your ears will a voice behind you saying "This is the way, walk in it". We need to listen for divine direction to stay on the right path.

Jesus was the embodiment of all the giftings we have; He embraced all we offer to build up His body here on earth. The Church needs diversity, if we are all the same the song of the triumphant church would have no symphony, it would be like an orchestra in which all the instruments played the same note! ## The Hive

The Southminster Community Hub known as The Hive is located in the URC Church building in North Street and has become a resource centre to serve the needs of the Dengie Peninsula. A lot of renovation work in the church has taken place and is ongoing with funding being sought for the upkeep of the outside gardens. The Rt Revd Dr Guli Francis-Dehqani, the Bishop of Chelmsford, has written a New Year message for 2026
