#### Norman Pratt's December Reflections

Christmas is coming! Mercifully it's coming at a decent pace, one day at a time. Now we're in Advent it will come at a more stately pace, one week at a time.

I don't think I'm alone in thinking that generally speaking everything else in life appears to be going too fast - everything from vehicles to supermarket self check-outs to how often my computer needs new settings. By the time we get a newspaper its news is out of date. Events rushed on to the television or smartphone make the newspaper look like an ancient document.

Nor is the news, when we get it, pleasant reading. Perhaps for Baby Boomers and Generation X, ironically, the end of the Cold War in the 1990's marked the end of normality, and the Two Towers attack signalled a new and more chaotic world. Thankfully the BBC valiantly presents feel-good stories interspersed with the inevitable horrors of Gaza and Ukraine, but there is no getting away from our country's politics appearing to be degenerating into continual chaos

And things happen fast. This is particularly true of the impact of Artificial Intelligence, or AI. One of the reasons young people are finding it difficult to get their first job is that AI has beaten them to it. AI is even beginning to take over the music industry from musicians. One estimate suggests that AI has halved the number of novelists.

It is probably too late to stop AI, because we are too dependent on it for essential services. But it is not too late to regulate AI, so that on the Internet upsetting material is decently locked out of instant access, and harmful material is kept to a minimum.

A related problem is the decline of reading. Only about a third of young people now read for pleasure. Many can't count, reasoning that they can use the calculator on their phone, so there is no point remembering those Times Tables!

As we, or some of us, become increasingly skilled at using our Smartphones to help us live out our lives, we are in danger of losing some of the skills that served our great grandparents and now ourselves very well. Generations before that knew how to grow their own food. One skill humans learned about 1700 years ago was silent reading. We even know the name of the man who first taught himself that particular skill - Ambrose. Before him a small percentage of people could read, but only out loud!

People all over the world are probably better informed now than they have ever been. This is largely thanks to the development of television and more recently smartphones. Unfortunately much of the information we receive is designed to entertain us - so that we are forced to look at the adverts! Some of the adverts of course provide useful information. But to find out particular information that we are searching for can be difficult.

I recently came across a story on Youtube that I was so pleased about that I left a comment recording my satisfaction. Another viewer immediately wrote back to me saying he simply didn't believe the story - and 'AI and searching the Internet' had failed to find the story anywhere else!

As it happened, I hadn't believed it myself to begin with. So I'd checked it up by searching for a reliable newspaper which might have run the story. Sure enough, 'The Independent' had run the story about a week earlier. The viewer who wrote to me had simply trusted in AI and Google to make sense of what is going on in the world. Unfortunately learning to search the Internet for information should have been on the school curriculum, but generally speaking it hasn't been.

The actual story was, as it happens, a very important one. You might have stumbled across it on a newsfeed on Facebook, but otherwise it was only 'The Independent' that picked it up. It was that 'The Vatican has clarified the Virgin Mary's role in the Catholic Church, stating that she did not help Jesus to save the world from damnation'.

This is a massive change in Roman Catholic teaching. For hundreds of years they have encouraged the tradition that we are saved through Jesus **and** Jesus' mother Mary. The Church of England, and Protestants generally, believe we are saved through Jesus Christ alone. And it's not just words, as anyone with a Catholic friend or has been to a Catholic country will know.

Fairly recently I attended a Catholic Mass for the first time in my life, and the words in the service were mostly identical to the ones we use in our Anglican Communion Service - except for a reference to the saving power of Jesus **and Mary**. So now the Catholic Church has discarded this tradition. It now follows the teaching of the Bible on this - that it is Jesus alone who saves us from our sins.

So as we approach Christmas let's remember Mary's response to the angel's request for her to be part of God's plan: 'Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word'. To be one of us, Jesus had to be born like one of us, and for a while to be totally dependent on other human beings. He would develop a brain with a finite number of neurons, just like us. He too would have to work hard to develop skills - in his case to become a builder and joiner. He would also have to learn Scripture off by heart which was the only way possible where you don't have universal literacy and printed Bibles. And like us he would have had to learn how to apply it.

As we await his second coming, a happy Christmas to you all!

# Staying Afloat

For many of us this time of year can be really exciting can't it, with buying gifts, sending cards and decorating homes, but on the other hand it is a time for some of financial difficulties and it's hard to even keep their heads above water. It almost feels as if they are drowning in debt with the extra expense.

With overwhelming problems, it can, for some, lead to depression which can feel like drowning.

Depression can be overwhelming and isolating and many people describe it as struggling to "stay afloat" and look for ways to drown their sorrows and hope someone or something happens to throw them a lifebelt.

We read in Mark chapter 4 the story of Jesus calming the storm. He and his disciples were in a boat crossing from the region of Galilee to another region across the water. A furious squall came up and waves broke over the boat so that it was nearly swamped. Jesus was asleep in the stern and the disciples woke him and said "Don't you care if we drown?" Jesus then rebuked the wind and waves and all went calm. He said to His disciples "Why are you afraid? Do you still have no faith?"

It sometimes feels, doesn't it, that we wonder where Jesus is when things get really tough. Like the disciples, our faith is really tested at times, and we wonder if Jesus really cares if we drown!

But we do know that The Good News is that Jesus came to be our lifesaver, He throws us a lifebelt! This Christmas time we look for the coming of our Messiah, our Liberator, Rescuer, Redeemer and Saviour. He came to save us from our sinful self. He came to help us see a new way forward and we can do that by opening our hearts to Him and asking Him into our lives to help us stay afloat.

The only way to keep our heads above water is to convince ourselves we are going to make it. We need to trust that Jesus is near and He really does care, and help comes often in unexpected ways. So, let's be vigilant and call out to him in our storms of life and Jesus tells us in Luke 11 v 9-10 "So I say to you: Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives; the one who seeks finds; and to the one who knocks the door will be opened."

Let us amidst all the clamour and preparations that Christmas can bring remember that the greatest gift we can receive is Jesus into our hearts and it is entirely free and we are truly indebted to Him for His ultimate sacrifice for us.


