A Happy and healthy new year to you all and we trust that this year will bring many 'new starts' into your lives; for the new year is all about fresh beginnings and starting anew. We thank God that we are able to have new beginnings with Him, and look forward to seeing which gift the Lord is going to bless us with in the congregation of the church. The church of God is growing and moving on; it has been and always will be 'alive' with Christ to guide the church. As you read this you will know that our own Bishop Stephen Cottrell will be moving on to York – we pray for Archbishop John Sentamu as he retires and pray for +Stephen to grow into the role to which he has been called. The whole church will be looking forward both to what Archbishop Stephen will bring to his new calling and to the next phase of our own Christian ministry, seeking where we too can be used and deployed.

I am so pleased that in the past year there have been many within the church, especially in St. Leonard's, who have taken on new roles, had their ministries recognised and encouraged, and have moved on with God in their gifts of ministry; developing roles in music, preaching, leading and pastoral support – many ways that God has enriched our Christian lives through the variety of gifts that have been surrendered to God and His people. We are all so appreciative of the enormous and, sometimes, costly, commitment that people within the congregation have taken up in order to serve God and us. This month's reflection is an opportunity for me to give my most sincere thanks for the past year, and to thank those who have helped to shape the church here in Southminster. For the church has grown in the activities with which it is involved, and grown in knowledge of the love of

God and grown in number as people hear the good news of Jesus through our links with the parish. There are more people willing to come to the church for services, for baptisms, and to find strength to meet the coming days. Every relationship that is made within the community is an opportunity to help others know the love of God and what His kingdom is like. There have been other things that I see as answered prayer for this parish. This year is the first year that this parish has had Christmas lights. This year the parish had a fireworks party rather than a Halloween party. This year the opportunities within the school have increased for students and staff. The swimming pool is more accessible to people, and the conversations are changing about life in Southminster and the Dengie; conversations that are more positive and optimistic for the future. I see all these things as answer to prayer as we continue to pray blessings on our neighbours, businesses and relationships; and I believe that there is still work to be done. We are in a battle to which we are all called: to offer ourselves again to God's service in a new way and both seek and receive His strength to do His will, whatever it is.

New Year Message from Bishop Stephen

When I'm having a bad day –or just as importantly, when I'm feeling a bit too pleased with myself –I say to myself that one day I will be my successors' predecessor. I find this helps me put myself in perspective. It also helps me to pray that the decisions I take are not simply for the good of the diocese while I'm bishop, but will be for the benefit of future generations in East London and Essex. As I pray for our diocese on the eve of 2020, I also wonder what our world will look like when the Bishop of Chelmsford writes their New Year message in 2070 or 2120.

This past year has seen concern for the environment grow. Where once we talked about sustainability, we now question whether the fundamentals of our present existence on this planet are sustainable at all. We now tend to talk about climate emergency not just climate change. As this emergency deepens, it is the poorest and most vulnerable who are suffering most. In October, I took my staff team to the Franciscan Friary at Hilfield in Dorset to learn how a community of Christians can intentionally adapt their lives to not only reduce their environmental impact but also positively enhance their corner of creation. Please visit them yourself and learn from them. Their heat comes from biomass. Much of their power from solar. Their food is LOAF (local, organic, animal-friendly and fairly-traded). Their animals naturally tend their wildflower meadows and they generously work with their neighbours to create corridors to support natural habitats. How would our attitude to God's creation differ if we, like the Franciscans, had to draw our water from the ground directly beneath our feet? Would we discharge the waste and chemicals into the soil and drains that we currently do? Please join me this year in seeking to live gently in the world and enhance God's creation. You are your successors' predecessor. In 2020 bless the inheritance that you bequeath them.

I wish you a peaceful, gentle and sustainable 2020.

Beauty for Ashes

I was asked recently where I get my ideas from to write articles for the magazine and my immediate answer was my inspiration comes from God. God gave me a gift of writing that I had long given up on after a disastrous and humiliating attempt at school to write a humorous essay for which I felt so ashamed and I said I'd not go there again, so my dream to write turned to ashes.



But God had other plans! Very soon after becoming a Christian I felt led to write poems for many years which developed into the articles I write today.

Sometimes our hopes and dreams are dashed by an event, a criticism, lack of encouragement or ridicule and this can permeate our lives for years and years where we feel useless and don't bother to try again.

But all is not lost! In Jeremiah 29 v 11 it says "For I know the plans I have for you declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future". In Joel 2 v 25 it says "I will repay you for the years the locusts have eaten" and in Isaiah 61 v3 it says "I will bestow on them a crown of beauty instead of ashes. These very encouraging verses are often quoted and it's good to read them in the context from which they are taken and all given because God is a merciful God.

Ashes are mentioned quite a lot in the Bible, they are shown to be a symbol of grief and repentance; of mourning and to show penitence and remorse. People also used to put on sackcloth which is a coarse material such as goat's hair which was very uncomfortable to wear, so their penitence and repentance was often observed in sackcloth and ashes.

So, how do we regain our hopes and dreams? How do we receive Beauty for Ashes? For me it began by asking Jesus into my life; asking Him to forgive me for any wrongdoings I had done and asking Him to help me find His purpose for me and then in return help others.



So, as we go into a new year let's ask God to stir up the embers and breathe life into the ashes again and restore to us the lost years and give us the courage to try again lost dreams or even give us new ones!

May this New Year be truly one of the Lord's favour!

What is the Church for? Ken Dunstan

Three Decades ago, the Anglican Bishops worldwide Lambeth Conference asked, “What is the Church for? What is God sending it to do in the world?” Their answer, our “job spec,” was five tasks, called the Marks of Mission. They said, “The mission of the Church is **the mission of Christ**,

1. To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom
2. To teach, baptise and nurture new believers
3. To respond to human need by loving service
4. To transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation
5. To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth.”

The Church of England’s Environmental Working Group says, “Everything we do must be seen through the lens of the environment. We are all called to exercise leadership in this area, prioritising the fifth mark of mission ‘to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth’, and without this being done wholeheartedly the other four marks lack credibility in today’s context.”

Yes, you read that correctly. Unless we act as God’s stewards to preserve the Earth God called “very good,” our telling of Jesus, our teaching of disciples, our service and our challenge to injustice, will all be incomplete. I write as we prepare to move into 2020, and I trust that we **will** be able to invite others to follow Jesus, and to live the life of God’s Kingdom of mutual service and justice. The Green claim is huge – the Fifth Mark encompasses all the others. Genesis 1:26 shows that humanity’s first purpose is environmental stewardship – rule over the earth as beings made in God’s image and sharing God’s love for God’s Creation. Genesis 2:15 says that humanity’s role is to tend and care for Creation. Everything else is secondary.

In order to ensure that we really do “strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth,” Chelmsford Diocesan Synod created a Diocesan Environment Group, to advise on policy and remind us of facts. Our Archdeacon, Elizabeth Snowden chairs the Group. In 2010 the Group produced a revised policy, called, “It is possible to live differently.” (It’s available on the Diocesan website.)

Followers of Jesus must know the facts of human impact on God’s blue planet. Climate change through human-caused global heating is one of them. So are the drowning of the earth in plastics, the decimation of forests and vastly increased extinctions, the pollution of air and waterways and oceans, the death of corals, and the beginning of a wave of climate refugees as people are rendered homeless by the twin evils of flood and drought.

Our environmental concern must cover the Fourth Mark; unjust practices cause the worst effects of environmental damage to be suffered by poor people, those least to blame and least able to cope.

But knowledge isn’t enough. As surely as Jesus’ first message was, “Repent and believe the Good News” (Mark 1.15), so he calls us now to live new lives, not just of spiritual renewal but of real care for creation. That requires changes of lifestyle, including hard choices about travel - and lifestyle..

The alternative to repentance is simple: God’s planet will become a desert.

God said to Adam, “Cursed is the ground because of you.” (Genesis 3:17)

Is that what we want for our descendants?

Think about thisand pray for further guidance and courage.

Confirmation 2019

In the days when the Church first began converting pagans to faith in Christ, baptism was chiefly for adults. As these converts became parents, they wanted their children to be fully part of the Church as well, yet they wanted also for the children to profess faith for themselves. This was resolved by turning Christian initiation into two parts: baptism for babies as well as adult converts, followed as the 1662 Prayer Book puts it, “when they come to years of discretion,” by a ceremony to take the baptism promises on themselves, that is to confirm them and their faith in public and to be confirmed by the laying on of the Bishop’s hands with his prayer that they will be “filled with the Holy Spirit more and more.”

So it was that on 24 November we gathered at Bradwell Parish Church for the Confirmation of Christians from Southminster, Latchingdon and South Shoebury. Southminster’s contingent included John Anderson, Jessica Brewster, Ian Smith, Carole Tookey and Kim Dunn, who was baptised during the morning service at St Leonard’s before Confirmation in the afternoon at St Thomas’ church.
