

Reflection by Norman Pratt

What do we mean by this word 'Reflection' we have as a heading in every church magazine? I always think of August as supremely the month for reflection. Well, I would do, wouldn't I, having been a schoolteacher for most of my working life. What else would I be doing for those 6 weeks of holiday?! But other suitable occasions spring to mind. Some people become suddenly reflective at the end of December, and ask themselves whether it was a good or bad year. Some of us do more disciplined reflecting during Lent.

Perhaps it's more important to do some reflection every day as part of our daily pattern of prayer, when we have a quiet time of prayer or read a passage from the Bible. At one time I read from the daily readings in 'Daily Light'. Every day this book presents verses from all over the Bible on a common theme. Daily Bible notes are also very helpful, as most of us need guidance about what to reflect on. But perhaps it is even better to read passages from the Bible 'neat' as it were, especially from Psalms or from the Gospels and just trust the Holy Spirit to help us understand.

Some draw their inspiration from Radio or Television programmes. Radio is especially useful as you can catch programmes whilst on the move. I generally catch 'Pause for Thought' on Radio I every morning. Other reflections are available on other channels! Personal prayer should I think always be accompanied with a degree of reflection. Even when we are using a set prayer like The Lord's Prayer we need to be thinking about what the words and phrases mean, not just saying the words.

There is, of course, nothing quite like talking directly to God, an amazing privilege we have through our Saviour Jesus Christ, and

the very fact of having to say something to Him or perhaps more often asking Him to do something forces us to think or reflect on what we are saying.

Coming to God in collective worship offers perhaps a different range of things to reflect upon. Services of Holy Communion are a particular occasion for reflection. To an outsider it might appear it is regimented with worshippers all doing the same thing. In fact it's almost the opposite, isn't it? We all come as ourselves, just as we are, and eat bread and drink wine while reflecting on what we are doing.

Morning Worship on Sunday on the other hand is a service that offers an opportunity for a different kind of reflection. One thing that can sometimes be missed from our personal reflections and prayer is worship. Morning Worship always starts with words of worship. We reflect, using words from the Bible, often directly from the Psalms, and acknowledging the God who made and redeemed us.

Throughout the history of the Christian Church, Christians have felt themselves wanting to reflect more deeply in order to draw closer to God. The first step was often to reflect on their sins and foul-ups of the day, ask God's forgiveness and move on. The next was often to own up to the 'hidden sins', the ones they had not been aware of. In the early Church some became hermits in order to live in isolation in order to concentrate on God. Later Christians sought to get closer to God by living as monks in monasteries or nunneries. Personally I'm thankful that we can reflect and concentrate on God in our (extraordinary) everyday lives.

and we all have life skills that can be used to help another.

We often see in job advertisements that experience isn't necessary as training will be given. When we look at Jesus calling his first disciples, ordinary men, called in to a whole new world, away from the familiar. He used their work backgrounds and their skills to further his Kingdom, each one complimenting the other to work and use their skills as a team just as we do today.

The disciples spent 3 years with Jesus being trained to be able to go out into the world with the Good News of the Kingdom of God and he used their life skills gained to His and their advantage. We, too, have the ultimate trainer through the Holy Spirit who Jesus promised would come and be with us as our trainer and guide.

Some of us have to work hard at achieving a specific goal in life. I felt at the age of 39 that the Lord wanted me to learn to drive! Even if we feel unqualified in an area, if God calls us, he will equip us with all we need. I know I learned so much from my driving test failures and continue to learn in all areas. I feel it is right to explore new challenges and even if it is tough going at times, with the occasional tears, the rewards are immense.

Deuteronomy 31:8 says: "The Lord himself goes before you and will be with you He will never leave you nor forsake you, do not be afraid do not be discouraged." After all our God does not always call the qualified but He loves to qualify the called!

Christine Lucas writes..... "The Jewel in the heart"

Recently I was struck afresh by a verse from Ecclesiastes which tells us that "God has set eternity in the human heart." Ecclesiastes 3:11. This reminded me of the well-known saying that, "There is a God-shaped hole in the heart of every person," which I found to originate with the renowned 17th century French Catholic mathematician and physicist Blaise Pascal. So what does this mean?

One Bible commentator suggests that we each have an inborn sense that life will continue beyond this present existence, although God prevents us from being able to fathom the mysteries of creation. Our heart or spirit is what marks us as being created in God's image, and is the essence of a person. By placing eternity within our hearts, God has given us the desire to know Him and communicate with Him. This potential makes humans uniquely precious to God. He has created a longing within us that can only be satisfied by Himself. As St Augustine of Hippo famously commented," Our hearts are restless until they rest in Thee." Although our bodies are mortal, we are created as eternal beings intended to live for ever in God's Presence. Jesus teaches that there will be a Last Judgement when God will decide our eternal destiny, depending upon our response to His offer of salvation. If we reject Him then we shall still live forever, because we are eternal beings, but tragically apart from Him. Eternal death is an unthinkably dreadful prospect! However, for Christians, God's perfect love casts out all fear! The Good News is that, "For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, so that whosoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life!" John 3:16.

Humans try all kinds of well-documented ways to satisfy our inner longing for meaning and purpose in our lives which can denote an unacknowledged desire for the eternal. The pursuit of money, fame or power; various over-indulgences; and many excellent things such as caring, charitable work, careers, art, crafts, science, music and sports, etcetera. Obviously all these things can be very fulfilling, up to a point! We do not necessarily recognise what we desire, but Christians believe and experience that Jesus Christ is the only One who can save us from death and fulfil our deepest need for ultimate meaning and peace with God.

By setting eternity within the human heart, like a jeweller placing a precious stone within an attractive setting, our Creator and Heavenly Father has given each person an exquisite gift: the potential to have an eternal, loving relationship with Himself, in fellowship with other believers. Our relationship with Him is for the present as well as the future; it's not just cerebral, or a feeling. The wonderful truth is that if we repent of our wrongdoing and invite Christ into our hearts we can be born again into His family! He calls us, not for our selfish satisfaction, but because He loves us and wants to teach us how to serve Him. We can listen to Him, and walk and talk with our Lord and Saviour every day, receiving His ongoing forgiveness, guidance, strength and consolation.

The writer of Ecclesiastes believed that life is ultimately meaningless; he saw death as the end of life, with no definite hope or promise of any life after this one, so he tells us to make the most of our short lifespans. Basically, he concludes that we should fear God, work hard and enjoy life. Nothing is wrong with that! Yet the statement that God has set eternity in the human heart seems to belie this teaching, hinting at something deeper, something wonderful to be realised in the future as part of God's plan of salvation.

This writer, thought by some scholars to be Solomon, believed in God, and might have believed in a promised Messiah, but he had no knowledge of Jesus Christ God's only Son, our Saviour. We, on the contrary, living after New Testament times, are privileged to know about Him and to be able to experience Him through the Holy Spirit who comes to live in our hearts. So our inner emptiness can be filled with the 'jewel' of His Presence! This is a miracle that can happen for each of us and for our family, friends, neighbours and acquaintances who do not yet believe. Our hearts are the setting crafted by God to hold His priceless gift. The Gospel challenge to each of us is whether we are willing to repent of our wrongdoing and turn to Christ in faith. As 2025 continues apace, we can all hold fast to the Christmas message: Emmanuel - God is with us; and rejoice in our Easter proclamation that Christ has risen! As the old chorus says, "He lives, ... Christ Jesus lives today...salvation to impart; ...He lives within our hearts" If we have not already done so, He is waiting for us to invite Him in. Nowhere in Scripture does God promise us an easy life, but He does promise that He will always be alongside us to sustain us with His Love. As we learn to follow Him. 9
