Vicar's Reflection

The changing scenes of the landscape of the Dengie have been in my thoughts over these past few weeks and months, in the way that we see the rivers changing and the fields around us changing, and adapting to the new environment that they/ and we find ourselves at present. The fields that were more traditionally planted with rapeseed, wheat and barley, have transitioned over the years to include Lucerne, beans and peas for animal feed uses, and, even more recently we've seen many fields have been planted with vines. It demonstrates the changes to climate that we have experienced in these past ten years, and maybe an indication of demand for certain produce, as well as the ability of the land to produce. Some of the fields have now had major housing developments built upon them. We have welcomed those new to the village and the families that have come along since to the church and into the community. Our parish churches have changed and have adapted to utilise some more up-to-date technologies with screens, sound systems and wi-fi; making adjustment to the way that we hear and receive God's word and also the way that we make our regular giving. The culture of surrounding villages is changing too, as new technologies and new people move into them, contributing with their particular gifts to the community.

How do we feel about those changes? Are they inevitable or random? Are they an interruption to the way of life that we have enjoyed these past years? The changes that we see may be refreshing or confusing to our way of life, however, we cannot help but change with the times, in some things we must 'keep up' or we may miss a blessing.

All around us change is occurring it can demonstrate to us the creativeness of God and the gifts that other people possess and are willing to share. The Community Hub is a prime example of gifts being shared for the good of the community, where people are able to draw on professional help and meet with others who are able to assist in times of need.

Change will occur over this next year as we 'send' Jacqui, with our blessing, on to her new post as incumbent in another parish. A daunting yet exciting moment for her as the years of study and practice come to fruition in her new context. Change will have come to that parish, new seeds will be sown, the gospel will be told in a different vein and another harvest is sure to be gathered. Similarly, Fiona and I will move on to a new place as we retire, although this will be after late 2025 once I arrive at 70, and into the beginning of 2026: it is another change that will occur in the next year or so. Have a little faith! Our recent visit to St Paul's Cathedral Christine Lucas and Sandra Billinghurst

When we heard that the Rev kate Bottley was going to be talking at St Paul's Cathedral on 16th April, we decided it would be too good an opportunity to miss. Each of us enjoys visiting places in London and we thought it would be wonderful to see Rev Kate Bottley! The event was in the early evening so we decided to make a day of it and left around midday on the train. We planned to see a few places close to St Paul's first. We visited Postman's Park, which opened in 1880 on the site of the former burial ground of St Botolph's Aldersgate church and later expanded to incorporate the adjacent burial grounds of Christ Church Greyfriars (this is now a ruin). Since delving into her ancestry, Sandra discovered her 4x great grandparents were married there on 4th May 1817.

In 1900, Postman's Park became the location of a memorial to ordinary people who died while saving the lives of others who might otherwise be forgotten. There is a wall housing over 150 memorial tablets that give a short description of each event. There are some tragic stories and some remarkable tales of heroic rescues. The park is now laid with gravel paths and flower beds but there are still some ancient gravestones to be seen.

We later found ourselves in Paternoster Square near Ludgate Hill, formerly one of the highest points in the City of London, just behind St Paul's Cathedral. It was formerly the site of Newgate Market. On the night of 29th December 1940 during the Blitz many of the buildings here were destroyed. Here we saw some beautiful bronze animal sculptures that are the work of the prolific duo, Gillian and Marc, who are behind the chimp sculptures near London Bridge and the bronze lions near Waterloo. After some difficulty with map reading (!!) we eventually found the St Paul's Garden of Reflection but were disappointed to find it partly covered over. However, we did manage to glimpse the Cathedral in the water, especially when Christine climbed onto the low surrounding wall, although she was politely reprimanded by an official who promptly emerged from an adjacent building!

We enjoyed some lunch and a couple of coffee breaks and then attended Evensong at 5pm. The café in the Cathedral crypt is spacious and peaceful, but doesn't shy away from London pricing, which probably contributes to the upkeep of the beautiful Cathedral! Kate Bottley describes her faith in a way that makes it encouraging for young people to join the church. She was also signing copies of her new book, and posing for selfies and photos.

Have a little faith!

Are we nurturing our mustard seeds? The Lord Jesus teaches us that if we have faith even as small as a mustard seed, it can move mountains! God moves mountains through our faith, however tiny it is.

This very encouraging and challenging thought underpins Kate Bottley's recent book. "That vicar off the telly", as Rev Kate Bottley is often referred to, gave an engaging early evening lecture in St Paul's Cathderal on 16th April as part of their Adult Learning programme, which also served to promote her new book "Have a little faith!" We probably recognise Kate through her presentations and appearances on YouTube, Radio 2, Songs of Praise, Pilgrimage, or Gogglebox. She has what one might perhaps call a 'marmite' personality, claiming to be disapproved of by some members of the church hierarchy, who consider her approach and style to be too undignified and populist. A self-confessed extremely extroverted show-off, Kate is unashamedly passionate about sharing the Gospel with the wider non-religious community beyond the church doors, who seldom enter the building. The numerous folk who "aren't religious, but. ..." The 'cultural Christians' who like church buildings, candles, singing carols, and want their children christened, and who choose to be married and buried in church. To her, their mustard seed faith is every bit as valid as that of any preacher in a pulpit.

Kate was introduced by Dr Paula Gooder, who is Canon Chancellor of St Paul's. A respected theologian, writer and speaker, she's responsible for the Cathedral's extensive Adult Learning programme, which is available both on line and in the building, free of charge. This is well worth a look, as it comprises a wealth of interesting talks, etc.

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Kate has a fascinating life story, jam-packed with amusing anecdotes. She was christened in a non-churchgoing family who didn't even go at Christmas! As the first generation fully literate female in her working class Sheffield family, Kate initially attended church through a school friend, so as to meet the vicar's son, Graham, to whom she's been married for 26 years. Her moment of 'absolute conversion' came when someone asked her if she believed in God, when Kate realised that her faith had been like a rarely-worn coat hanging in her wardrobe, that she'd only recently tried on. I love that analogy! Kate thinks that this is a common experience for many folk who are 'cultural Christians', who often discover faith at times of life's big events. Given the right encouragement from us, their faith has huge potential to be nurtured and to grow, just like the mustard seed!

She has absolutely loved being an RE teacher in rough schools, which included her bringing real babies in as visual aids for lessons in baptism and watching a police drugs raid involving the Dad of a pupil from her classroom window! Whatever your opinion of her style, Kate's passion to share the good news of God's love with those who have no knowledge about Christian faith is surely inspirational.

Quickly discovering that she was not cut out to be a churchwarden, being not particularly interested in church buildings but longing to distribute Communion, Kate emphasizes that she didn't choose or desire to become a priest but she heard God's call to ordination through her local church family. Kate became a college chaplain and then a parish priest responsible for three churches.

Notoriety came through a YouTube video of her dancing in the aisle with a couple whom she'd just married and their congregation. Soon after this she was verbally abused in a Tesco car park by someone shouting, "You whore of Babylon!" Nowadays Kate doesn't have a physical parish. Her fame escalated through social media so she has become a type of 'national vicar', with an invaluable ministry amongst media personalities and celebrities, a domain where few priests can easily tread. (Unless you are Rev Richard Coles, with whom she's occasionally been confused!!) Kate's oft repeated mantra is "You don't need to be professionally religious, or to believe everything every day, all of the time." She doesn't! Even a tiny scrap of faith is valid, and precious to God. She encourages us

all to nurture mustard seeds of faith wherever, and in whoever we encounter it. Faith is not measurable by its quantity, but its quality. We all meet people who protest that "I'm not religious, but...." who unwittingly reveal their mustard seeds! We shouldn't expect anyone who attends a church service to have any prior knowledge or to be familiar with our weird and sometimes off-putting religious language and rituals. E.g. What is Holy Communion, or a Bishop? (Just as a teacher of French wouldn't expect a student to speak fluent French as an entry requirement for their class.) Therefore Christians like ourselves need to adopt more accessible language and to fling open our closed church doors to warmly welcome anybody who wishes to come in, to embrace each person and to join community organizations and events. Of course, many members of St Leonard's Church family already do this, and there are continuing opportunities for development.

Regarding denominations, Kate studied at a Roman Catholic college in Leeds but declared that she isn't bothered which 'branch of the club' she goes to; "If God's in it, I'm happy!" She's experienced every variety of church from strict Evangelical to Roman Catholic, and always enjoys worshipping God in His family. Her book covers many topics, including the important choices we need to make about death and dying; not just funerals, but how we want to be cared for as the end of our life approaches. Sandra bought a signed copy of it and will be happy to tell anyone who's interested more about it. It's easy to order a copy on line.

We agreed we'd had a very interesting time, including hearing the exquisitely beautiful Evensong and joining in worship with a large congregation of visitors from across the world. We were in awe of the stunning architecture and hope to return for a tour in the near future. It's free to attend a worship service but if you want to explore the building you must pay an entrance charge. If you haven't been, we highly recommend it It was well worth the high step count and aching legs for a thoroughly enjoyable day! Let's keep watering our own mustard seeds and encouraging other people to grow theirs too! (Sandra & Christine)



My name is Dean, and this is my testimony.

For most of my life I was an atheist, believing in nothing after death and that the universe, with its intricate patterns and laws, just came into existence out of nothingness.

To feel the power of my testimony, I have to be incredibly open. Last year, I no longer wanted to participate in this world, I had no hope and was full of despair. Thanks to a loving and caring family I got through this time, but I still felt hopeless.

A year prior, my brother-in-law David tragically passed away at a young age. After his passing, I experienced many signs that proved to me there was more to this world. Witnessing firsthand spiritual events after David's death made the evidence of life after death far outweigh the evidence for nothingness once we pass. However, this didn't change my reality, my hardships, or how I felt about the world. I was still searching, and although I hadn't realised it yet, I was searching for God.

Leading up to the day of my salvation, God started to subtly appear in my life, but I wasn't paying attention. (Oh the joys of having an ADHD brain!)

On Monday 28th of October, on my way to work, road works took me on a detour. I saw a poster outside a Baptist church that read Jeremiah 29:11 "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." I had to stop the car and I broke down in tears. I knew immediately this message was meant for me.

It wasn't just the words but the image on the poster - a little grey stripy tabby kitten, which seemed random to have next to a Bible verse. Except, after my dark episode last year my wife had surprised me with a beautiful grey stripy tabby kitten to bring life and joy back into our home. Immediately, through this wonderful Bible verse and this beautiful image, I felt for the first time in my life God's presence.

I cried out to God, repenting of my sins, tears of contrition gently rolling down my cheek. On the 2-hour drive home, I had an intimate conversation with God (I did all the chatting. He just listened.) and it felt like I was a long-lost child estranged from his father, through neither's fault, who had finally reunited decades later for the first time.

When I got home that night and saw my wife, I started crying. She asked what was wrong, and I said, "These are not tears of sadness. I felt God's presence today. I don't just believe there is a God; I know there is a God, and today He showed me He exists."

Since that fateful day, I have grown in my relationship with God. I have witnessed firsthand many times the power of prayer, and He has shown me many things in the Scriptures that prove to me that the Bible is of divine origin and the inspired word of God, where He has intricately and precisely

placed every word, just as He has intricately and precisely placed every star in the cosmos.
