Vicar's Reflection "For I trust in your Word." Psalm 119: 42

The Bishop of Chelmsford Rt Rev'd Dr Guli Francis-Dehqani has urged us all to have a Holy Lent and to spend time to reflect in times of quietness before God, and reading the word of God. She suggests business meetings are only to be held if necessary - and speed and haste are to be avoided. "Ah! That's all very well", we might say, but the Bishop "doesn't have my life nor has she to contend with everything that I have to do". Yet, in busy-ness we might still find some time to 'see God in the circumstance and know the hope that is set within us.'

The philosophers would call this the power of positive thinking, or optimism, but these are earthly terms that tell us of the personal, inner strength that we might have. There are times when we do not have that inner ability or energy, perhaps through illness or grief, seasons when we are unable to summon up strength to see us through. We need to draw on something else, appeal to others to help us in our time of need. We are not to be *in*dependent but, rather, *inter*dependent; relying on or leaning on others to assist us through.

As Christians, we also have the spiritual strength given to us through Jesus in the power of the Holy Spirit – and we draw on this strength through the Word of God. Philippians 4:13 from the English Standard Version says to us "I can do all things through Him who strengthens me.",

Him being Jesus. As I read through the Psalms too (for instance Psalm 119 especially) we see how the psalmist emphasises the Word of God to give life – and to sustain life. The Word of God isn't just a collection of words set in 66 books, but words of life set in context of eternity, enabling us to remember that we are part of an everlasting promise and plan. These are words that give life. His power and His life. Words with such a dynamic of their own, spoken by Him: they are alive and active. [I looked up the word 'active' on a website which has set out answers to 687,227 Bible questions! It says "The term active as used in Hebrews 4:12 means "effective, powerful, producing or capable of producing an intended result." I love that God's spoken Word "produces - or is capable of producing - an intended result"!! "Effective....powerful."] (See, for one thing, the incredible example of that in Genesis!! "Let there be"... and it was!) They are words spoken by God to encourage us when we need to be reminded of hope. Verse 11 in Psalm 119 suggests that we "hide God's Word in our heart". A strange place for us to store something... yet it is the place where we hold things that are precious, loved; things that we feed on in troubled times, words of truth that give life. When we feed on these words of God, they restore our hope and increase our faith. Hebrews 11 says "Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see."

As we move towards Easter, we hear again the passion story, the journey of Jesus in the last week of His life, yet we will see the hope that is set before Him, the reason for Him coming and the fulfilment of the plans and purposes of God. Jesus did not shy away from the situation, He did not turn His back on the cross, rather He set His face toward the cross ready to bear the pain for each and every one of us. The Word became flesh and dwelt among us, to be one of us, to endure the sufferings of us all yet to have victory over that which had separated us from God. "For the joy set before Him, He endured the cross". The focus of Jesus was not on the immediate, but on future hope, and life.

We make this journey ourselves as we hear the passion narrative, walking with Jesus through Holy Week, His last days and hours – into Good Friday when we reflect on the cross – always remembering and feeding on the Word in our hearts, the hope that has been planted there, knowing that 'Sunday is coming'. It is then we realise that the whole of our earthly existence is holding on to Jesus, the Word of life, through the difficulties, journeying towards 'Sunday', knowing the victory and the joy to come. **God** has planted these words of truth into our hearts, and they are words of life..

As the Baptist minister Shadrach Meshach Lockridge from San Diego preached "It's Friday.....but Sunday's a-comin'."

He's alive, He's alive, He is risen. Hallelujah!

Training

It seems that everything we want to do nowadays needs a lot of training! When I think of it, we are always training for something from birth to all the way through our lives. Sometimes as adults when asked to do training we groan, but life moves on and technology moves on and we need to learn and constantly keep up to date. On looking at job advertisements they often say "No experience necessary, training will be given" which gives us all a chance to learn a new skill.

So, what is training? Training is teaching or developing ourself or others. Training has specific goals of improving our capability, capacity, productivity and performance. Leaders and prospective leaders in any form must be trainable and no-one must assume they know everything or be unteachable!

There are lots of references in the Bible about training. We especially know that for 3 years Jesus' disciples worked alongside Him and learnt from Him. In Luke 6:40 it tells us that Jesus said "The student is not above the teacher, but everyone who is fully trained will be like their teacher". We become more Christlike when we learn from Him and follow his teachings (2 Peter 3:18). To highlight this: Proverbs 3:5 says "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding"

The Christian life is often compared to running a race. In Acts 20:24, Paul says in his farewell speech to the Ephesian elders "My only aim is to finish the race and complete the task the Lord Jesus has given me, the task of testifying to the Good News of God's grace". On running a race, we know we need to train hard, be in good physical health and fitness, and in our work for the Lord to be spiritually disciplined and well fed with the Word of God.



2 Timothy 3:16-17 says "All Scripture is God breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work".

So whatever training we need to fulfil, be it for job training or for a role within God's Church, let's be prepared with a willing and trainable heart to learn. After all it is a willingness to take part which God will honour and we can complete the tasks He gives us knowing we have done our very best and others will see that too. Let us remember that when we make our first commitment to follow Jesus we will hear Him saying "Come just as you are, there is no experience necessary but ongoing training with Me will be given".

Since then she's had a succession of ups and downs, with improvements followed by relapses because she's launched into everyday work too soon.

Meanwhile I've been typesetting the Kunda New Testament (Zambia), working 'remotely' as usual via email and internet. In this way I'm providing technical support to another mission, Partners in Bible Translation. Their overall goal is the same as Wycliffe's, with some differences in how they approach the task. It has been a pleasure working with their team. We hope to complete the basic typesetting of the Kunda NT this month; and I will finalise it for printing in March.

My next project is the Dinka Cam Bible (South Sudan), which they expect will be ready for type-setting in June. As usual in the interval between that and the Kunda NT I'll be working on improving and maintaining the online Maps & Illustrations Repository.

Johanna writes about her work:

I have almost finished the five pencil portraits I undertook to do for Wycliffe South Africa: one of my frustrations with the concussion is that I would otherwise have completed them by now! But the last one—of a Rendille warrior—only needs a little more finalising. Then the pictures can be used to make greeting cards (for sale) and other promotional materials.

Steeple Church News

Steeple Church has services every Sunday morning at 9.15am unless otherwise advertised on the church door. We have Morning Prayer on the first and third Sundays each month and Holy Communion on the



second and fourth. An on-line service for those preferring to worship from home is available each week on www.stleonardsouthminster.org.uk

The Steeple Church belfry timber renovation project is expected to have been a major focus of attention at Steeple's Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) on 20th March because we are on the threshold of getting this project under way.

We received three responses to the tender request prepared by our architect, Hilary Brightman. She sent this out to companies she considered competent to undertake this type of work. The quotations showed wide variations so it wasn't difficult for the Parochial Church Council (PCC) to make its choice. Adding in costs for management of the project as well as fees already incurred for establishing the specifications means we need to think in terms of a £25k total budget. About two thirds of that amount is already in hand so the PCC now needs to seek the remaining third from organisations that make grants towards preserving listed rural churches. With construction costs heavily affected by current inflation, getting the project completed this summer is even more critical.

In parallel with seeking grants, we need to submit our Faculty Application to Chelmsford Diocese. This is the ecclesiastical equivalent of a planning application. The guidance notes require supporting documentation under no less than eighteen headings so gathering all this together is quite a task.

The faculty application gets reviewed by the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC), a decision making group comprised of architects and clerics. The DAC meets only monthly, so we need to get our application in by 7th April if it's to be decided at their April meeting, the day after Easter Monday.

If all goes to plan, you should see scaffolding going up by mid summer.

Twenty twenty-two is shaping up to being a very busy year for the small team that keeps Steeple Church open for those residents and visitors who wish to use it. As the belfry renovation gets underway, we also need to organise our two major fund raising events:

Wheels & Paws at Elmwood Equestrian, Burnham-on-Crouch, 10th July and Steeple Historic Gathering at Grange Farm on 21st August.

The poor maintenance of Steeple's churchyard in recent years has drawn criticism from people visiting family graves. We are grateful that where family members live locally, some have taken to mowing the grass in the vicinity of their loved one's grave but that's not an option for people visiting Steeple from places further afield.

Some of the donations received following recent funerals specifically mentioned the churchyard so the PCC has now set up a separate account to ring fence these monies for churchyard maintenance.

Otherwise, they might get swallowed up in general operating expenses, such as church heating or annual insurance.

The **BEREAVEMENT GROUP** meets in a quiet corner of the hall as part of Chatterbox.



I was reminded about this article recently which I wrote in 2019. It is a reminder of the cost of war in the world and the devastation that it brings. I have adapted it to the events happening today:

"Lord Jesus, I watch the Evening News and I try so hard to shrug off the grief of this wounded world, to brush off the pollution of greed and violence and sadness. In all the confusion I so long for Your Will to be made clear to those in authority for the future of this world.

This beautiful world was made through You for our pleasure and I thank you Lord Jesus for the many things that bring us joy. Forgive us that so much is now marred by our sin, our greed for power, spoiling serenity and peace.

I've thought so much of you this Lenten time as you walked in the desert my Lord, the tempter assaulting your senses with his testing and mocking and false promises. I know so little of your suffering Lord Jesus, but as I come closer to You my heart breaks too in feeling more intense pain for this sin sick world and grief for this wounded world You bore on your back.

I, Lord Jesus, can choose to switch off the Evening News and settle comfortably to watch something entertaining, to blot out the negatives for a time; the war in Ukraine, the casualties, the tragic loss of life and homes and livelihoods of Ukrainian and Russian families and beyond. But not you Lord Jesus; You in your mercy and love for mankind never turned Your back, never switched off and settled back comfortably.

No; You watched the Evening News and went to the Cross".

War in a place of which we know little, a long way from here.

No doubt we've all heard more than enough about conflicts, especially about the Russian invasion of Ukraine. That resulted in a million refugees just a week after the invasion and an expected four million people being displaced, whether or not they head for safety in Poland, Hungary, Slovakia, Romania or Moldova, and immense destruction to homes and hospitals, schools and shops. Families have been damaged, sometimes permanently broken as women and children flee and men fight and die. Besides Ukraine, bloody conflicts continue to rage in Syria, Yemen, Ethiopia and northern Nigeria.

What can be done?

For us, as Christians, the obvious first answer is prayer. And we pray remembering Jesus' words, "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you." What, I believe, God does not will is a "victory" by one side that humiliates the other. That kind of victory in 1918 was part of the reason for war in 1939. All we can do with our partial knowledge is to offer the whole dismal story to God and pray for both sets of leaders, that they may genuinely seek peace with justice. As we pray for the Ukrainian and Russian deciders, we must pray also for our own politicians, not least in the provision we make for refugees.

A long time ago a friend wanted to collect blankets after a disaster in Africa. The idea was good-hearted, but impractical. Blankets take a long time and a lot of money to get to areas of need. Although it seems impersonal, the best way to help after

prayer is to give money. Money is instantly portable. Online donations take just a couple of minutes. That money, in the hands of the right people, can be spent locally so that food, first aid kits, water purifiers, bedding and so on can be purchased and so that transport systems are not clogged. I said, "in the hands of the right people". Many people can be wary lest the money goes astray. So who are the right people? I would vote for the United Nations High Commission for Refugees (UNHCR) to deal with refugees outside the United Kingdom. Those who have arrived here will still need support. The Refugee Council is reliable.

For help on the ground, the Disasters Emergency Committee is a group of major disaster-management and development agencies including the Red Cross and Christian Aid. Even if the fighting has ceased by the time you read this, reconstruction will take years. Whatever you give will be spent responsibly and wisely.

But first, pray.

We were able to send £180 to the DEC from Chatterbox and are hoping to send more following the concert on Saturday 9th April by the Remedy Acoustic Band. Details on page 22.

Christian Aid Week will be with us soon:

May 15th - 21st.

We shall not be having a house-to-house collection again this year, but there will be envelopes available for everyone to donate funds appropriately.
