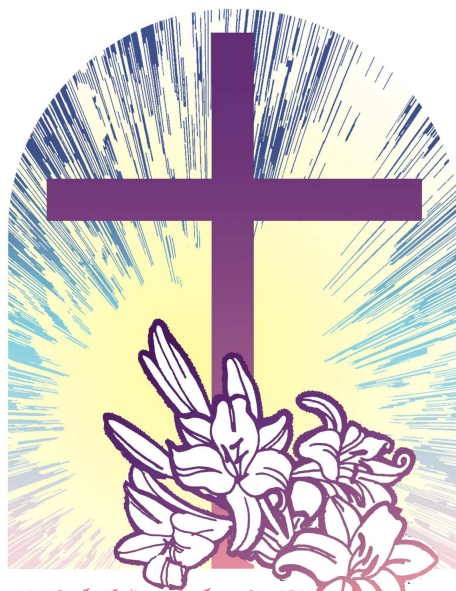

Vicar's Reflection

When I used to travel around the M25 to various parts of the country it gave me opportunity to listen to one of our many amazing Christian-speakers teaching CDs., or to the radio. There were some wonderful programmes to tune in to and learn new insights – it is just amazing what you can learn on 'Woman's Hour'!! I think there are a lot of men who listen to that on a regular basis. One of my favourite radio programmes was 'Desert Island Discs' and Kirsty Young's guests ranged from scientists to soloists, authors to actors. All had fascinating stories of humour and sadness, of fame, fortune, love and sometimes pain.

At a recent local gathering our guest speaker asked those gathered to think of three things that they would like to have on a desert island; the brief seemed too broad and raised many questions; how big is the island? Is the island fertile? Is it a warm island or cold? Is there vegetation, fresh water, trees – the list could go on and on. However, we were asked to think of three 'items' that we would want to have there. Answers were not too varied- something to cook with, something to obtain clean water and something practical, a machete seemed to be the most popular. There were some obscure answers too, and a yard of Jaffa cakes, cable ties and lipstick were some choices that raised a smile. But how difficult it is to choose just three things, for we do not know how long we might be stranded or if we would want to remain stranded. Some people would see a desert island as bliss, others may find it tortuous. What would your three items be?

If we were to find ourselves in the situation where everything is stripped away, what becomes important? What would keep and sustain us through the days until we are rescued? I don't think that a yard of Jaffa cakes would last very long! Nor would they really bring any comfort, excepting for a short time. It is the things that will sustain us, feed us and keep us fit and well in mind, body and spirit that are worthwhile. Possessions and success seem to pale when we consider our desert island.

Lent has been a time of stripping away the baggage and wants of our lives to concentrate the mind on those things that are important to us, to focus on the word of God, to say sorry for the times we have treasured worldly things and the times we have lost our way. We spend time during Lent in repentance for those times and we seek after God to plead with him for forgiveness and acceptance once again. God in His mercy and grace accepts us unconditionally as we truly turn to Him, He forgives us, covers us and protects us. We lay bare before His cross all our past anxieties, pain and discomfort and Jesus opens his arms and takes it all from us. We have been rescued!! We are no longer isolated, we are no longer alone; Christ has rescued us and has given to us new life – a liberated life to live with Him in joy, forever. Amazing grace..... I once was lost but now am found.....We Have **Been Rescued!!**

Who is my Family?

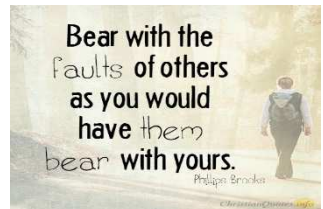

In Mark 3: 31-35. Jesus was accused by his family and the teachers of the law; they were saying He was out of his mind because of his teachings and healings.

They accused him of being in league with the devil. We read that His family were looking for Him and when they came to the house where He was, they sent someone in to call Him and tell Him his mother and brothers were looking for Him. Jesus' reply was "Who are my mother and my brothers?" Jesus went on to say that belonging to God's spiritual family, evidenced by obedience to Him, rates higher than membership of our human families. This must have sounded harsh for His earthly family to hear. But later on in the bible we do see a real love and concern for his mother Mary when, on the cross, He saw his mother near and he asked the disciple John to take care of her. The Demise of the Printing Industry

Section 8. Continued from last month.....

Before moving on to what finally did for Letterpress printing. Here are some sayings you may have heard of. They come out of the Printing Industry.

You will possibly have heard of.....'oh he came a cropper' In the mid 1800's an engineer invented a hand fed Platen Printing Press called the Cropper. It was very popular and became a print shop standard. Even machines of a similar type were grouped as 'Croppers' rather like vacuum cleaners were always called Hoovers. Moving machinery always presents dangers for the careless. Hand fed printing machine more so. Crushed fingers, even parts of fingers missing amongst machine minders pointed to someone who had had such an accident. They had 'become a cropper'. The saying was then applied to people who were perhaps careless or accident prone.

I explained earlier about Printers Pie. This is when a form of type either falls apart, or over. When I think back I feel it is amazing there were not many more disastrous Printers Pies. The individual pieces of type would be left for an apprentice to put back into the correct places in the type tray. This leads onto another: 'Mind your P's and Q's'. Bearing in mind all type is reversed the two letters p and q in lower case are easily confused. In the type tray too the respective slots for the letters are close to each other. It is a thankless task tidying up a Printers Pie. The apprentice would be told, a kind of warning really. "Mind your p's and q's."

‘Out of sorts’ is another. Individual letters in a complete font set are called sorts. There are limited numbers of each letter in a font set too. More of the vowels than consonants, as they appear more frequently. Then some consonants appear in text more than others so there would be more of them. The fact that some printing jobs were likely to be repeated, meant the setting was saved for next printing. This led to some letters, on occasions, being in use, often vowels would run out. The compositor who would have put a lot of work into setting would then become quite grumpy at being unable to finish setting the job. If you enquired ‘what is up with him’ you were told oh he is out of sorts! I believe there is another version a medical term for someone being unwell because they are ‘out of salts’?

In an earlier section I mentioned the skill required in the process of evenly spreading the ink on the blocks by use of the Pelt Balls. An expert would be called a Dab Hand! From the action of spreading the ink. Thus if someone was proficient at almost any skilled activity they became ‘A Dab Hand’.

Thank you for enjoying music with us.

Farewell Bishop John

As we have been aware for many months our Bishop of Bradwell is now Bishop of Liverpool. We were able to attend the farewell service for him at Chelmsford cathedral on 26th February. Many clergy and other official people spoke about his leadership and support during his time here. Our Canon Peter was one of those, and it was great to hear his important contribution on this occasion. He mentioned particularly John's approach: to listen, love and lead.

Ken and I have put together our version of what Bishop John said in his address. This indicates how valuable he has been here and how we can continue his Christian ministry.

Bishop John said:

Remember the story of the boy whose toys were in the garden shed. He wanted the toys so his mother told him to go and collect them. He said "But I'm afraid of the dark." Eventually his mother persuaded him to overcome his fear and collect his toys. "Be brave. God is with you."

We have three main questions to God in our lives which echo those of Moses on Mount Sinai, meeting God :
(Exodus 33)

Show me Your Way. God answers " I will go with you." We are in a time of uncertainty, so can we find the way God has for us? We have to trust Him, knowing that he knows the way and is the Way.

Show me your glory. I need evidence please. There is no answer, other than "You have my name. I am what I am."

You can't define God; He is beyond that. We need to see God's glory in quietness and peace.

You cannot see my face (only my back). "When I have gone past you, you will see me. You'll see me when you look back. You will realise that God was/is there."

The Church is God's. We have to trust Him. Don't expect spectacular experiences. We're on a journey - until we reach the end. Don't ask God to understand you better. He knows you perfectly already.
