Reflection for April

It's some while since I wrote a 'Reflections'. So 'Hi!' As I write, it happens to be the evening on the day of our Monday morning Bible Study where six of us sat around in the Chapel discussing the topic 'Hope in Politics', led by Jenny. One of the things we agreed upon, as Christians, was that Truth is important, so it is upsetting when politicians twist it. However, we were reminded of a very comforting Truth, that whatever happens in the world, however upsetting, God is always in charge.

It seems to me that in some ways it has become harder to get at the Truth. It's not that we can't get access to thousands of voices via TV, mobile, radio, or newspaper. But which ones can we trust? Sometimes it can be simply a misleading headline like 'Precise time 10" of snow expected': this turns out to a threat not to the daily commute to Chelmsford but just parts of the Cairngorms! More seriously even trusted media platforms like the BBC are constantly under attack for being biased even when they are trying hard to find a middle way.

Fairly recently I complained to BBC News when they failed to give the name or title of a bishop they were interviewing, and then gave his name and title on the screen a few minutes later to an apparently random bystander! As it happened the bishop was making a sensible and calming comment about a nasty incident that led later to a riot. I still wonder whether if the bishop's comments had been covered better the riot might have been prevented. Later, after thorough investigation of my complaint to the BBC, I received an acknowledgment that something had gone wrong with their system for providing written labels on the screen for their interviewees. The BBC is of course light years ahead of the social media companies in taking responsibility for their content. Although something is at last being done about the sort of Internet content that can do immense harm to children, the net is otherwise regulated inadequately. Indeed some companies who control social media platforms claim they are acting in the interests of Free Speech by not keeping a watch on the stories they are spreading. Another issue is that most of these social media companies, like our newspapers, are owned by just three very influential 'media giants'. They influence a great deal of what we read. In the USA recently a well respected newspaper warned its well respected cartoonist not to criticise President Trump. To his immense credit he refused to have his own freedom of expression restricted and resigned.

The power of the media, and particularly the power of cartoons, once played an important part in Church History. In 1517 Martin Luther, a professor of theology at the University of Wittenberg in Germany, wrote a 95-point criticism of some of the beliefs and practices of the Catholic Church, and sent it to the archbishop of Mainz.

But new media took over. That new media was printing, which had been invented only about fifty years before. Luther's ideas somehow got into the hands of a printer just down the road, and hundreds of copies of his 95 Theses were printed and distributed. Soon printed Protestant pamphlets were circulated to many people, and supporters of the authority of the Pope replied. Argument descended into name-calling. Woodcuts - the latest media - allowed cartoons to be circulated, showing the pope wearing his famous tiara, eagerly counting out the money taken through Indulgences. Papal supporters produced woodcuts depicting a dragon-like devil squeezing Luther's disembodied head as though it was the bag of a bagpipes, and blowing into Luther's ears whilst his fingers played the chanter coming out of Luther's nose. I won't tell what some Protestant cartoons did with the Pope's tiara ... And it got much worse, on both sides.


The arguments within the Church grew increasingly bitter, and they degenerated into a vicious slanging match. Not surprisingly Luther had to flee for his life and find refuge with one of the many German princes. The Catholic Church of Europe split in two, the North generally becoming Protestant and Southern Europe generally Catholic. The pamphlet war did immense damage to the unity of the Church. Later in the 16th Century the Roman Catholic Church held their own Church Council of Trent, which resulted in its own Reformation, where they put right many of the criticisms of Martin Luther. But the Council failed to reunite Protestants and Catholics. The argument begun by Luther had become so divisive that Europe was torn apart in a series of religious wars between Catholics and Protestants which lasted over a hundred years.

The split in the Church in the 16th century provides a warning about how churches should behave today, but also about how we ourselves as individuals should behave. Internet media provides tremendous opportunities to communicate with one another. But it also provides opportunities to upset a lot of other people. On a well-known Internet platform, I was carefully presenting an argument and backing it up with what I thought was overwhelming evidence. For a moment I ignored the fact that I was disagreeing with what twenty or so people had just written. For some reason, or possibly because it was after midnight and I wasn't really thinking, I wrote something like "... so if you think like this you must be bonkers." About ten minutes later when I looked at the platform to see if there was any reaction, I couldn't find my post. A moderator had spotted and removed it, and quite right too!

The first lines of a lovely poem by William Henry Davies say "What is this life if full of care, we have no time to stand and stare". Life can be very difficult at times, we all go through trials that can seek to overwhelm us, trials that fill

our minds and can take way our peace and affect our physical wellbeing too. These are the times when we need to lean on our Lord so much and inhale His promise to be with us always and to walk with us through every trial that comes our way.

This Easter time let us remember the agony Jesus went through in the garden of Gethsemane before his painful death. He inhaled courage and exhaled fear and went obediently to the cross to die for us all.

Community Hub update.



The Community Hub Management Committee meet each month at the URC Church building in North Street to discuss plans in progress for the refurbishment of the building and to discuss policies and procedures which need to be in place and also fees for hiring space within the building.

It is hoped that at the beginning of April the interior renovations inside the building will start in earnest. A new kitchen will be installed in the rear of the building as well as a small one in the front of the building. An extra toilet will also be installed in the front of the building, adding to the ones in the rear, so that both halves of the building can be used simultaneously as separate entities. The outside of the building will be landscaped and fenced off so the parking will be for building users only.

The URC building is already well used and our Community Development Worker is busy seeking out and working with many organisations to help make the Hub a hive of activity for people of all ages and abilities in this Dengie area.

Jesus, People, Building ... Ken Dunstan

In the process of reducing six decades-worth of clutter, Kath and I discovered a photocopy of a local paper from September 1943 describing the church building. It began, "To the casual passer by, the parish church of Southminster ... is just a large single building in which services are held on Sunday... the historian and antiquarian... is never tired of exploring it and endeavouring to wrest from it the secrets of bygone centuries." At the same time, Christians would want to say, "The Church is people, not buildings." How do we tie the two together?

Jesus never built a church. He called people to follow him. Eventually his first followers attracted thousands more.. Twenty years after the Holy Spirit's coming, St Paul wrote to "the churches of Galatia" in one of the earliest writings of the New Testament. But to exist, let alone thrive, these disciples of Jesus needed to meet. As the church grew, houses became too small. Praying together and encouraging one another were vital (Hebrews 10:25).

Our building is around 900 years old. The Newspaper article suggests that prior to that a Saxon building stood on the same site, the centre of Southminster. It was expanded in the early 16th century by the Prior of St Osyth and again between 1818 and 1819 by Admiral Nelson's secretary, Alexander Scott. The process was paid for chiefly by Parliament and Charterhouse, the Patrons who appoint our Vicars. This included free seating for "the lower orders" – the "upper" classes paid pew rent. Our building, the place where the church meets for prayer and encouragement, served the community then, and continued by Scott's founding of the School. We try to, still. The building has other secrets – for another occasion.


On **Sunday 11th May at 4 pm** we shall be hosting the **Remedy Band** at Southminster with a concert to **celebrate D-Day**.
