Vicar's Reflection

The beginning of a new year is a good time to look back on the past year to see where God has shown us His grace and taught us about Himself and his kingdom. I was absolutely delighted to be reacquainted with a mum at a Christingle service whose daughter I baptised two years ago. This little girl had not had a very good prognosis from the doctors when she was born; her life was in the balance and the parents asked if I would baptise her as soon as possible as they wanted God's blessing for her should she not make it through the year. We baptised her and prayed for her. Part of the problem was that her skull had not formed completely; not unusual but hers was only two thirds formed. The doctors said that the likelihood of continued growth of her skull was less than 5% and it would be likely that they would need to put a plate onto her skull. Well: two years on, through a pandemic where hospital appointments have been rare and specialist consultants hard to meet with, mum took the little girl for a scan at the hospital and met with the consultant who told the mum that he was in shock and amazed because the skull had grown completely! The consultant said he couldn't understand how that could have happened – but we know a God who is able. Needless to say, that made me stop for a moment to thank God for what He had done: nothing that we could do – just God.

Then I thought of the other lives that have been transformed because God had done something wonderful in their lives, those that had given themselves wholeheartedly to God and found peace with themselves and God; and those who have

spoken to me about how they have been spiritually fed by the word of God, all of these people have not just been encouraged by me – they have been encouraged by you, the parishioners who are willing to serve God in the various ministries that you have been given. You the parishioners have been salt and light into people's lives, you have loved your neighbours as yourselves, you have been willing to sow seeds into other lives, and let God grow them. You, the parishioners, are special and are greatly appreciated.

These thoughts and reminiscences reminded me of Paul in prison, giving thanks to God for the church that he loved so much in Philippi; remembering how the church had grown, flourished and been maintained by faithful people. The Philippians provided for Paul; they sent news to him along with messengers that had personal messages. They gave money for the work of planting other churches, and they remembered him faithfully in their prayers. John Calvin once said “Prayer doesn't change things – God changes things in answer to prayer”

As we enter a New Year, with fresh starts that have been granted by God as we turn to Him, may we continue to pray for God to change hearts and minds, to bring us all into a better knowledge and understanding of Him and His kingdom. That we will be able to look at 2022 with excitement about what God is going to do in this benefice. May our prayers be like that of Paul “In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy” Philippians 1:3

With our love and prayers that you will all have a blessed 2022.

Backwards and Forwards

Are you someone who starts to move forward in one direction and then changes to go back in the opposite direction? Perhaps you are being tossed around mentally, longing for perhaps the stability of former days and afraid of the challenges of the future? Are you stuck at the crossroads of life unsure of the future?



And now, we venture into a New Year! As we look back over 2021, how did it impact us? Was it a good year with new challenges? Was it a real struggle with health or other personal issues? What did we learn from it? Can we pass on any experiences to help others?

I have been inspired for this article by a 1979 Dusty Springfield song called “I think I’m going back.” She sings about returning to her younger days and re-living the times and great games she played with her friends. Dusty also recognises that as she grew up there was so much more to do and that every day could still be fun and her “magic carpet ride” and she could still “live her days instead of counting her years.”

In 1 Corinthians 13 v 11, St Paul says “When I was a child, I talked like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I put the ways of childhood behind me.” We often look at our age and long to be able to do the things we used to do but I suspect most of us are still very young at heart and enjoy what we can.

We see examples in the Bible of people looking back and losing so much blessing and even their lives. One example is Lot’s wife in Genesis 19. Lot and his wife lived in Sodom, a wicked and depraved place. Two angels of the Lord came and told Lot to flee with his family before the coming wrath of the Lord as He was

going to bring about the destruction of Sodom. As they were fleeing, Lot's wife hesitated and turned back and looked back to see her life, everything she valued going up in smoke! She hesitated and became a pillar of salt; she became preserved and physically incorporated as a memorial into the land she so desired to continue occupying. She couldn't let go easily and move on and so lost her future life.

For some the past can bring up painful memories or for others idyllic times but in the words of St. Paul in Philippians 3 v 13-14 he says: "Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus." Also, the words of Isaiah 43: 18-19 say: "Forget the former things, do not dwell on the past. See I am doing a new thing. Now it springs up do you not see it" We can't always change the past but we can learn from it and go on and embrace the future.

Dusty goes on to sing "I'd rather see the world the way it used to be, a little bit of freedom's all we lack so catch me if you can I'm going back". Yes, we all think this at times, especially in these difficult, unpredictable times in the world where freedom for some is not an option be it through war or poverty or recently by Covid. Growing older can bring its concerns especially health wise but in Dusty's words "Thinking young and growing older is no sin and I can play the game of life to win."

Our walk with the Lord doesn't exempt us from the difficult challenges of life but His presence with us is guaranteed and He wants us to walk with Him through them and above all enjoy our lives as best we can and to bring His joy into the lives of others.

“For me to live is Christ and to die is gain. If I am to go on living in the body, this will mean fruitful labour for me. Yet what shall I choose? I do not know! I am torn between the two. I desire to depart and be with Christ which is better by far; but it is more necessary for you that I remain in the body. Convinced of this, I know that I will remain and I will continue with all of you for your progress and joy in the faith, so that through my being with you again your boasting in Christ Jesus will abound on account of me.

Philippians 1 v 21-26.

We thank God for those people in our lives who are supportive and encourage us to follow Jesus even if they are not yet believers. Thank you that they love us enough to allow us the freedom to follow Him and in turn we love and continue to care for them too on our journey.

It was no surprise that the funeral for John Partridge on Friday 10th December was attended by over one hundred and fifty people. That's more than Steeple Church can hold so some were in a marquee in the churchyard. The whole service was professionally video relayed to the marquee and 'live streamed' on the internet, for the benefit of family members as far afield as Australia and those local people who could not attend due to Covid restrictions.

This was followed, just two days later, by a smaller but far happier event. The 'Christingle and Carols' service attracted twenty people, ranging from babies-in-arms and small children through to an octogenarian. Jenny Pratt and Vicar Peter provided the oranges and other materials for the children – young and not so young – to complete their Christingles, with the excitement reaching a noisy crescendo when everyone stood in the aisle, the candles were lit and the lights turned off.

Down to earth with a bump in January. We'll be turning our attention to the project for renovating timber around the Church belfry and other overdue maintenance work, such as repairing the roadside gates and cutting back overgrown hedges around the churchyard.

HOW CAN WE PREVENT A TRAGEDY?

This morning I'm finding it very difficult to find something "uplifting" to write about, given so many dreadful events in recent days, particularly those involving children. I don't need to quote any details about what has gone on – let's just say I'm thinking particularly of a certain 12-year-old girl and a certain 6-year-old boy.

All I can say is: let's be vigilant as we go about our daily activities, and if we spot any signs of trouble not only for children but for anybody, seek advice as to whom should be told. Let's keep an eye on our friends and neighbours, and if something seems amiss, do something. Let's remember lots of people live alone and could fall without anybody knowing, and be on the floor for a good length of time. I'm sure we can all think of this happening to somebody we know – I certainly can even though it was some years ago.

It would be a good idea if we telephoned if a house has been in darkness for a few days – or even hours if there's normally a light - and we aren't sure where the occupant is. Chances are that they are fine but it doesn't hurt to check and they won't mind.

Some of the events in recent news would not be prevented by caring neighbours calling, and I don't know the answer to "Why are so many young people carrying knives and even guns these days?" There's a whole debate about the entertainment industry and the media – and recently I heard of a theory that relates violent incidents to poverty. I don't buy that, although I do understand that peer pressure makes children very unhappy and that could be the tenuous link. Peer pressure is a serious issue. It's what makes

youngsters start drinking and taking drugs, yet oddly enough apparently smoking is on the decrease, perhaps because of the price of cigarettes these days.

As adults we can only give guidance as best we can and if we are aware of a family potentially in trouble, help if we can or seek help from experts as to what to do if something serious is going on. But first of all, we need to be aware of what's happening around us so that we don't have to hear of tragic incidents in our vicinity.
