Reflection for March Rev'd Ken Dunstan

During the last few weeks Norman and Jenny Pratt have hosted a series of Bible studies on the last book of the Bible: Revelation. It is written with a whole series of pictures with multiple meetings. One scene includes "the Four Horses of the Apocalypse." These four animals are ridden by riders representing war, disease, famine and death. The scene is prophetic in the sense of saying how things are, not necessarily how they will be. Those four threats were part of daily life in Roman times, and they're with us still. One feature of life under Nero and his successors was an enormous gap between rich and poor. Slavery was normal, though not as savage as the slavery of kidnapped Africans in the West Indies and the United States. Israelites had rules, including what to do when selling one's daughter as a slave, which limited the duration of slavery for men, and gave rights to a slave wife. Today, 40 million people, mainly women and girls, are in slavery of various kinds world-wide

In the United Kingdom, the top richest fifth of the population own two thirds of the wealth and a little over a third of the country's income. The poorest fifth own half of one percent of the wealth and under a tenth of the income. The top 1% earned 14% of total income just before the financial crash of a few years ago; the bottom **20**% earned **8**%. John, writer of Revelation, would not have been surprised. Nor would he have been pleased.

In 2009 Kate Pickett and Richard Wilkinson wrote "The Spirit Level: why Equality is better for everyone." They

demonstrated that severe inequality erodes trust, increases anxiety and illness, (and) encourages excessive consumption. I'll return to the question of consumption later.

I used the church toilet recently (Too Much Information?) and saw a picture of our toilet's twin in Zimbabwe. Sanitationrelated illness keeps people from working, children miss school, parents have to pay for medicines or food and fall into debt. Our twinning helps people in areas without the necessary plumbing for a domestic toilet to avoid this. Toilet twinning is part of the work of TEARfund, an offshoot of the Evangelical Alliance which Southminster Church has supported in the past. We have helped our "twin's" people to build a safe, hygienic toilet. Thanks be to God for enabling us to use our plenty for this.

And this leads me to "excessive consumption." I get bombarded with adverts for holidays, many of them cruises, most of them requiring flying. At the same time, I hear of numerous problems brought about by rapid climate change brought about by global heating. The increase in wild fires in areas where drought has turned trees into tinder, more (and more severe) hurricanes and cyclones and recently, more flooding after heavy rain are symptoms of unwelcome change. Glaciers are melting, as are ice caps. Once the glaciers are gone, many places will lose their water supply. And the warming, principally at the poles, will increase sea levels as ice melts. Not only that, but as the seas become less salty, the system based on the Gulf Stream Atlantic current will grow weaker and Britain will cool to a climate more like Norway's. And it's caused by the emission of "greenhouse gases" like Carbon dioxide and Methane which trap reflected heat from

the earth. The cruises and the flights are serious contributors to this process. So, too, are frequent private jet flights. Frequent, private jet flights are the preserve of the wealthy. Their consumption – including big houses and big cars, second homes and frequent travel between them are doing the most damage per person to the world God made and loves and has called us "to serve and preserve." (Genesis 2.15). The late Margaret Thatcher once said, "No generation has a freehold on this earth. All we have is a life tenancy, with a full repairing lease" Many people over the last century have published variations on the statement, "We have not inherited the earth from our fathers. We are borrowing it from our children." We are also doing harm to those who have contributed the least to the damage, including our diocesan partners in Kenya,

Part of me apologises for a "lecture cum rant." But as the Psalmist wrote, "The earth is the Lord's and everything in it." (Ps 24:1) Get informed. Find informed, committed friends. Act together.

Welcome to the Grief Club Because you don't have to go through it alone

This was the title of the book that inspired us to run the 8-week Bereavement Course we held recently at St. Leonard's. The course embraced brief writings, illustrations, and creative diagrams to explore the wide range of emotions and experiences that grief can encompass.



We looked at ways of navigating through grief and emphasised that for each person it is a unique journey. There is no right or wrong way to grieve, we do it our way, the way best for us, realising there is no set time frame but that grief does change and soften over time.

We also looked at some of the helpful and unhelpful things people may say and that some people may even avoid us for lack of knowing what to say!

We talked about the variety of emotions we may go through, namely: Sadness, anger, guilt, numbness, and then the physical symptoms of grief which can manifest as we struggle through the busyness of paperwork needed after an immediate loss and then the possible letting go of belongings and the reality of noticing the real emptiness when a loved one isn't there anymore. We may feel very tired and low and this is the time when we need the support of others where some may need to talk about their loved ones or may need to just sit with a friend or go for a walk and not say much at all. There are so many different types of grief, not just bereavement, namely a job loss, a divorce or any loss which changes our lives. During this course we particularly focussed on the death of loved ones and we all participated and shared memories and how we have navigated, or still are navigating our way through our losses. We built up a really comfortable rapport with each other and when asked to briefly sum up the course one of our ladies said "I felt it was a lovely safe place to be"

We hope to all meet up in the near future and check in on how we are all doing and may hold another course later in the year.

Meanwhile there is an informal Bereavement group in the URC Church in North Street on a Tuesday Morning, which is a time to chat and share with others. This is run by Chris Martin and she would love to hear from you if you'd like to go along.

The Community Hub Management Committee meet each month at the URC Church building in North Street to discuss plans in progress for the refurbishment of the building and to discuss policies and procedures which need to be in place and also fees for hiring space within the building.

It is hoped that at the beginning of April the interior renovations inside the building will start in earnest. A new kitchen will be installed in the rear of the building as well as a small one in the front of the building. An extra toilet will also be installed in the front of the building, adding to the ones in the rear, so that both halves of the building can be used simultaneously as separate entities. The outside of the building will be landscaped and fenced off so the parking will be for building users only.

The URC building is already well used and our Community Development Worker is busy seeking out and working with many organisations to help make the Hub a hive of activity for people of all ages and abilities in this Dengie area.

In times past, it was traditional for young women working away from home to be given a day off on the 4th Sunday in Lent so that they could take a bunch of spring flowers to their mother, hence the name Mothering Sunday. This year it occurs on 30th March because Easter 2025 is quite late in April.

At Steeple Church we like to celebrate Mothering Sunday in a traditional way with a service that's particularly focused on children.

During the service we'll provide each "child", whether young or not-so-young, with a potted plant to give to their mother. If their mother is not in church they can take it home and give it to her later, perhaps during a family lunch.
