Reflection: Travelling Well Together

When Bishop Stephen Cottrell arrived as Bishop of Chelmsford, he made a tour of the diocese, asking questions. A year later he announced a Diocesan Strategy. It proposed that we should be "a transforming presence in every community." It asked that we should Live distinctively, Evangelise effectively, Serve with accountability and Reimagine ministry.

When Bishop Guli Francis-Dehqani arrived as Bishop of Chelmsford, **she** made a tour of the diocese, asking questions. A year later **she** announced a Diocesan Strategy. There the similarity ends. She accepted the four priorities of "Transforming Presence", but shifted her emphasis from "what we are to **do** as a diocese," but rather, "how, guided by shared values, we are to **live**." This means, discerning locally, in our very diverse Diocese what it means to be God's people.

On Shrove Tuesday, Professor Jane Williams from St Mellitus College, Chelmsford, addressed the annual Clergy Study Day on "Living from Grace", a key part of the shared values that Bishop Guli had described. The Bishop had arrived at them by several months of consultation and prayer, coloured by her experiences as a Christian in Iran when Iran became an Islamic Republic that tried to extinguish the small Christian presence which had previously lived in harmony with its Muslim neighbours. Churches were closed, schools and hospitals were confiscated, financial assets were frozen, foreign missionaries were called home or forced to leave.

Some Iranian Christian leaders were assaulted or murdered, including Bishop Guli's father and brother. Forty years on, the Anglican Church in Iran is tiny. There is no infrastructure, leadership is "scant" and baptism is illegal. Persecution continues. And yet, the Church is still there. Bishop Guli says, "They are there. They are present and they are faithful. And while they remain they speak of God's love and faithfulness and they witness to the miracle of life in Jesus Christ. In doing so they offer hope for all of us." Despite everything, "the Holy Spirit has been active in Iran." The Anglican Church in Iran is, slowly, growing. So Bishop Guli's approach is to let local churches discern how to build on what is good from the past, how to live, how to travel with support from the Diocese for local initiatives, rather than "top-down" Diocese-wide initiatives. Bishop Guli says, "When given space to breathe, the Holy Spirit works through our fragility, brokenness and failures." Just as in Iran.

So we can travel, guided by the Spirit, believing that travelling well matters more than knowing a fixed destination.

So what of those seven "shared values"? Dr Williams suggested that the first and seventh are foundational. They are: first, "awareness of grace", and seventh, "openness to the unexpected and surprising." Jesus demonstrated God's grace. He transformed the lives of people with a poor record like Zacchaeus the greedy tax collector and Peter, who had denied even knowing Jesus. We can rely on God's loving grace for us, which is unconditional. There are no qualifications to let us earn it. And we must be open to divine surprises and look for the Holy Spirit's work in them.

That's enough for now. The other five values are to be found in the twelve-page booklet, "Travelling Well Together" to be found at the church, or obtainable from the Vicar, Canon Peter Begley. Now where did I put my walking boots...?

This planning is ongoing and this is a new way for the URC Church building to be used and it is stressed that it is still a worshipping church and the new purpose for it is underpinned with prayer and good management. Working together for the good of the community in this area is the aim.

I thought of that lovely song we sing called "One more step" speaking of Jesus being with us on our journey. The first verse says "One more step along the world I go and from the old things to the new, keep me travelling along with you"

We are all on an earthly journey from birth to death, a journey of discovery, a journey full of ups and downs, sadness and joy, a journey of continuously learning and all with God by our side guiding us as we journey home to be with him for ever.



So, "How are you travelling?" There is another song that comes to my mind by Michael Card, which says "There is a joy in the journey, there's a light we can love on the way". Some times in our journey home to heaven we can become weary and despondent but let's keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, the light of the world, who lights up our path and with his loving help, leads us on.

MEANINGFUL POSSESSIONS

Recently I have been thinking that if my mobility worsens very much I might have to think about moving to a bungalow or a flat, and the dread of having to clear out unwanted belongings is almost enough to make me forget the idea altogether. As it is, I've put it on the back burner whilst trying to work out whether to make the move while I'm reasonably fit or wait till I break a limb and wish I'd done it before. I hasten to add, for anybody else going through the same thought processes, that I think falling down the stairs is not the most likely event that could cause an accident at this time of life. Because of being aware of the danger of a flight of stairs, we tend to be extra careful going up and down them and therefore less likely to take a tumble. I think it's more likely that we can slip in the bathroom or trip over the threshold leaving or entering the house. So moving to a property that might appear to be safer is possibly not the answer to the problem, as a bungalow or flat is probably just as full of hazards as where we are now.

So having cheered you up with those thoughts, my next concern is "what to get rid of?" Even though I'm by no means a hoarder, when I started to look through my possessions, clothes, files and everything else around the house, I began to realise how much "stuff" one can accumulate in sixty years – for that is how long I've been in this house.

What could be got rid of? Boxes and bags full of packs of photographs? Black and white pictures of my parents' wedding in 1940? Or of holidays with my grandmother in the 1950s? Or of my late brother as a child? Old CDs that never get played? Books that were either enjoyed or are waiting to be read? Clothes that have been in a wardrobe or a drawer for 30 years? My children's old school books?? My grandchildren's art from when they were toddlers? Home made Christmas cards they made as toddlers? Ornaments! Who needs ornaments these days? But....they are memories of the past, or gifts from somebody dear who is perhaps no longer in my life. My wedding presents...my parents' wedding presents...my in-laws' possessions... there are so many "precious" items (for sentimental not financial reasons). Far too many to pack away and take anywhere, and I can't bring myself to part with any of them.

Every time I see filmed reports of refugees fleeing with barely one suitcase full of their life's belongings, I feel so sorry that they would have had to leave behind so many meaningful items. How lucky I am to have all my memories stashed around me.

And it looks like I'll just stay put till something happens whereby I feel I HAVE to leave...

Steeple's Annual Parish Meeting in March confirmed the reappointment of Churchwardens Rhona Leech and Teresa Julien. Rhona also agreed to continue as PCC Secretary and well as being principal organist, with Teresa taking major roles in fund-raising projects.

The PCC is completed by Rev'd Jacqui King, Fiona Ashworth, Fiona Begley and Treasurer Peter Marshall, who is also Roll Officer and informal verger. Anthony Williams stood down from the PCC because he can seldom attend meetings but remains a vital resource when the PCC starts to address repairs highlighted in the recent Quinquennial Report.

Although Steeple Church has met all its financial commitments for twelve consecutive years, the PCC has reluctantly accepted that it cannot meet this

year's sharply increased Parish Share demand. It hopes to achieve two thirds of the requested amount but even that is proving difficult.

Most established organisations suffer from steadily increasing age profiles but not Steeple Church. Several long serving members of our community have passed on in the last couple of years but their numbers have been more than balanced by many more children joining us recently.

It's now not unusual for "under 16's" to represent one third of the congregation. They only take limited part in the services but thanks to Rev'd Jacqui their "art work" explores religious themes which are helping to establish sound foundations for the lives ahead of them. Hopefully, some of them will be bringing their own children to Steeple Church in decades to come.

Waifs, strays and other children in need Ken Dunstan

In 1881, Edward Rudolf, a civil servant, ran a Sunday School with his brother Robert. One day, two boys failed to attend, and Edward later found them begging in the streets. Their father had died and their mother could not feed them and their five younger siblings. Edward could not find a Church of England children's home for them. Having settled them in a suitable place, Edward decided to start a society that would house others like the two brothers. It took a while, but in time the 'Church of England Central Home for Waifs and Strays' was born.

Nine years later, it had thirty five homes and changed its name, first in 1893 to the 'Church of England Incorporated Society for Providing Homes for Waifs and Strays,' then in 1946 to the 'Church of England Children's Society,' now known informally as the Children's Society, still a Church of England organisation working to fulfil the Fourth Mark of Mission, challenging injustice and trying to put things right for children. The Society no longer keeps residential homes, but works with young people in need in local communities, co-operating with Local Authorities and the Youth Justice sector.

Some children are runaways, sleeping rough and in danger from abuse; particularly girls. Now a new challenge has arrived, that of refugees. The Society says, "Too often, when young asylum seekers arrive in the UK unaccompanied, they are left to fend for themselves. They feel alone. They may have escaped conflict. They might not speak the language. On top of this, they have to navigate a confusing immigration process." Gaining asylum can take several years and often means telling their story several times to a variety of officials and busy social workers, reliving the trauma that made them flee their homeland.

The Children's Society now works with a group called the 'Youth-Led Commission for Separated Children.' Simply put, they want each child arriving unaccompanied to have a legal guardian who can accompany them in their quest for asylum, deal with officials and more. Ever since my first-ever Christingle service over three decades ago I have supported the Society. I think their current initiative, which includes useful myth-busting to counteract the lies told about asylum seekers, is really worth supporting, not least, financially.
