Reflection

Two dozen or so years ago there was a fashion in business and some other organisations for Mission Statements. Inevitably, the Church joined in. Southminster Parish Church has a careful, but rather complicated statement. It reads, "To be a people offering praise and worship to God and serving Him by being the Good News by our words and action." Twenty-three words. Relatively recently our website shortened it to "To serve God and the community." Six words! My son Mark's three parishes in Hertfordshire say, "To know Christ and make Him known." Seven words. There's an almost cynical proverb, five words that we must address: "Fine words butter no parsnips." So how do we butter our parsnips?

It seems that people expect new bishops to come up with a Diocesan Plan To Get The Diocese Moving. Certainly Bishop Stephen spent a year touring the Diocese when he arrived, and later announced a way of achieving what was already part of the Diocesan Mission Statement, "to be a transforming presence in every community." This "plan" had four components: Living Distinctively, Effective Evangelism, Serving with Accountability and Reimagining Ministry. This meant that the character and behaviour of the local church would change the wider community in which it was set. It's interesting that when Bishop Guli arrived, she spent a year touring the Diocese before publishing her conclusions as "Travelling well together." I'll return to that, but let's remember she accepted those four components of Bishop Stephen's plan. We would do well to find ways to fulfil them.

Bishop Guli's "plan" is, I think deliberately, a non-plan. There is no set of actions for everyone to follow. Rather, Guli

has set us free to make local decisions and then to get Diocesan support for them. But she has identified some shared values that will aid the local decision-making. Before I turn to them, let's remember that the world wide Anglican Communion that we are part of has two other bits of butter for the parsnips.

First, the words of Jesus, when asked, "which is the greatest commandment?" Rather than pick one of the over 600 in the Scriptures, He said, "Love God with everything you are, and love your neighbour the way you love yourself." Later, He added, "Loving your neighbour includes loving your enemies."

Second, the Anglican Communion asked, "What is the Church for? What does God command?" and summarised what we are sent to do as Five "Marks of Mission." Briefly, these are, Tell people about Jesus; Teach/Train new disciples; Tend those in need; Transform unjust structures and Treasure God's Creation.

These actions, Bishop Guli believes, will depend upon the values we share. This month, I'll name them. Later, we can look at them more closely. The first is, Awareness of grace. We recognise God's provision for the Church's needs and live thankfully. Valuing the small, the vulnerable and the marginal. The world longs for growth and success. We can rejoice at growth, but remember that, as EF Schumacher wrote, "Small is beautiful." God values the small and fragile as much as the big and robust. Focussing outwards. It's easy to let care for the church and its unity replace care for God's world and its need of the Gospel. Sustaining healthy rhythms. lesus offers life in all its fulness. That balances leisure,

recreation, prayer and service. It includes supporting one another, "sometimes carrying those who are struggling most." Kindness, mutual respect, gentleness and humility. These flow from Jesus' "New Commandment" that we should love one another as He has loved us. (John 13:34) Being generously collaborative We need one another and we need to work together. Differences can help! Together we are the Body of Christ. Being faithful, creative, courageous and open to the unexpected and surprising. Our traditions are valuable. But one of them is our recognition that the Holy Spirit leads us into all truth. She is the God of surprises!

Well, there's the list. There are copies of "Travelling well together" in church. However we read it, do pray for these Diocesan values to be properly explored and held. As I say at The Peace: "In the one Spirit we were all baptised into one body. Let us therefore pursue all that makes for peace and builds up our common life." Amen? Amen!!

TIME OUT!!

In one of my daily readings in March I read this following excerpt which made me smile and with permission from 'UCB Word For Today' I would like to share it with you.

"An old, tired looking dog wandered into a woman's garden. She could tell from looking at him that he had a good home. He followed her inside, down the hall, and promptly fell asleep. Two hours later, he went to the door and she let him out. The next day he came back, resumed his position, and napped for a couple of hours. This went on for a week. Curious, the woman pinned this note to his collar: 'Every afternoon your dog comes to my house for a nap.' The next day the dog showed up with a note that read: 'He lives at home with ten children – apparently, he needs some quiet time. Can I come with him tomorrow?'

What a lovely story, I found it really amusing but reminded me to think of those people who get very little respite from being in a caring role or a very demanding work pattern. One of the lovely sayings of Jesus in the Bible in Matthew 11:28 is "Come to me all you who are weary and burdened and I will give you rest". Jesus understands as He often used to take himself off to quiet places to pray and recoup his energy, a brief respite from the constant demands of his ministry.

We recognise that it isn't always possible to get away from demanding circumstances but on the other hand sometimes people have too much quiet and feel alone and long for some company or to be able to escape four walls. Let's remember to factor in to our lives some 'Time Out' this may take the form of some solitude to sit quietly and pray, read or even catch up on some rest like the dog in the story. Let's find whichever way works best for us personally and let's not forget those who may need a 'bolthole' at times which we may be able to provide.

Some Extra Thoughts from Ken Dunstan

I am always aware of the Anglican Communion's fiveitem summary of what God calls and sends the Church to do in the world. The list is called the Five Marks of Mission. The Fifth Mark says that God commands us to "strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and to sustain and renew the life of the earth." That's committee-speak for "This is God's world and he wants us to care for it properly." Our new Bishop of Bradwell, The Right Reverend Adam Atkinson, was consecrated as Bishop on 29 September. During the service, Bishop Adam received his Bishop's pectoral cross. The cross, worn on the chest, declares a bishop's ministry. Bishop Adam's cross is unique. It's made from fully recycled materials by East London jewellery maker, Jay Keshani, who specialises in handcrafted pieces using recycled single-use plastic. Bishop Adam's cross, a mix of dark green and jade-like colours, was made from approximately 15 waste plastic bottle tops.

Speaking about his cross, Bishop Adam said: "The pectoral cross is a wonderful piece of equipment for me. It not only looks and feels beautiful and intriguing, but, being repurposed waste plastic, reflects an important theme and passion for many of us relating to the natural environment

and caring for God's creation." Something discarded as waste reworked in the service of God to be something beautiful is also a symbol of grace and what we can be through Jesus. Bishop Adam added, "I hope this simple pectoral cross will spark conversations about how we can protect the natural environment, take responsibility for our actions and waste, but also provoke us to think about the gospel." Bishop Adam's cross is a mark, not only of his mission, but also of ours.

If you want to make an even bigger impact on wildlife, wait to mow your lawn or a section of it until August to support even more animals. Steeple Church held its Annual Parochial Church Meeting on Tuesday 23rd April. After appointing our Churchwardens and Parochial Church Council members the Trustees Report and Financial Report for 2023 were approved. The Parish Share forwarded to the Diocese increased by 9% but was only two thirds of the amount requested.

We achieved our objective of getting the refurbished church gates installed in time for Easter. They are mounted slightly higher than before so now open without dragging in the gravel. The job is not quite finished because we now need to rebuild the pillars on either side.
