Reflection by Ken Dunstan

In 1986 two Christian families moved to Portugal to create a Christian Field Studies Centre. It was called "The Rock" – in Portuguese, that's "A Rocha." By 1994 it had become internationally known and expanded with a focus on distinctively Christian projects for nature conservation in needy areas. Projects had developed in Lebanon, Kenya, France and Canada as well as the UK. They included "Eco-Church" which encourages local churches to examine their impact on their natural surroundings.

Between 1997 and 2009, when he died, Keith Morris owned 5 Hectares of land at Foxearth, near Sudbury on the Essex-Suffolk border. He had developed it as a nature reserve, and his widow Maureen sold the reserve to A Rocha in 2015. From then until this year it has been in the care of Mark Prina, who has said, ""Habitat loss and climate change mean Foxearth Meadows is already a refuge for depleted wildlife. Places like this will enable our countryside to return to a richer natural environment."

That's the background. Kath and I visited the reserve in 2019. In June this year A Rocha invited us to an open-air service, to be addressed by Canon Mike Parry, Chairman of the A Rocha Trustees. We had a good time.

Mike quoted Psalm 104, a joyful description of God's relationship with Earth, commenting that caring for God's earth is not for the select few. It is for all of us. Foxearth Meadows is hugely rich in dragonflies and damsel flies. Climate change has brought immigrant species from the Continent. Climate change – global heating – is caused by rich countries burning fossil fuels – coal, oil and gas. The worst effects are felt in poor countries that have contributed very little to the greenhouse gases in the atmosphere.

Nationally, Britain is losing insects. We had an entertaining few minutes thinking about creatures that we do or don't like. Butterflies, yes (except caterpillars eating cabbage leaves) Wasps, no (but they eat 14 million kilograms of greenfly and caterpillars a year.) Earwigs no (but they eat insects attacking pears.) Slugs no (but they control some invertebrate pests; hedgehogs love them). Matthew 6:19 condemns moths as destroyers, and the Bible has many references to destruction caused by locusts.

What about us? For generations we have been at war with insects. We began to "win" seventy years ago with new insecticides, until Rachel Carson's "Silent Spring" led to the banning of DDT. But DDT's heirs, like neonicotinoids, which kill bees, are more poisonous still. Flea killers, often from the fur of dogs, get into waterways and kill fish. Meanwhile, weedkillers and oil-based fertilisers can damage soil structure and soil's inhabitants. There has been a massive decline in insect numbers.

"Why worry? We can do without a few species." Really? Loss of pollinators means loss of fruit. We are part of nature, not distinct. One in six wild species in Britain is at risk of extinction.

St John of the Cross saw the interactions of living things as evidence of the love of God. He taught that the

more a person participates in God, the more he or she participates fully and joyfully in this community of creatures. Jesus taught that besides loving God, we must love our neighbour. I don't think it's going too far to include our non-human neighbours. They too are part of God's creation. Genesis 2:15 has God putting Adam in the Garden of Eden to "till it and keep it." The Hebrew words can equally mean "serve and protect" it. The fifth Mark of Mission – what God calls us to – is to do just that. We are "to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth."

Let us consider how we, as individuals and families, and as part of God's Church family, can serve and protect the amazing place He has lent us. And act.

Check ups

As some of us get older we seem to be called by our doctors more often for check-ups. It seems to be mostly Cholesterol, Diabetes and Blood pressure they seem to be more concerned about, and of course our weight and lifestyle!!



Check-ups are good, they highlight any concerns that we may not even be aware of and so often we have to make lifestyle choices or go on to medication if appropriate. Also, as well as physical check-ups we also need mental health and spiritual check-ups.

Thinking about the health checks we have today, I got to thinking what it was like for Jesus' first disciples as they often followed Him on foot for many miles over rough terrain at times, having to sleep rough and eat where and when they could and probably not being able to wash themselves regularly. They must have had times of feeling poorly physically and mentally. Not an easy life.

So, was there any help for them? We know that physicians existed in those days with their various remedies and that Jesus Himself healed many people during His travels. We know later that St. Luke was a doctor which must have been a comfort to those who travelled with him!

So, does the Bible mention anyone with physical or mental health problems? We read in 2 Corinthians 12:17 that St. Paul had a thorn in the flesh which he had to live with, and it has been suggested it was an eye problem. We read in 1 Timothy 5:23 that Timothy suffered from recurring stomach problems and was told by Paul to stop drinking only water as safe drinking water was often hard to find and he was instead to use a little wine. We also read in Philippians 2:25 that Epaphroditus a fellow worker with Paul and Timothy had been seriously ill and almost died in his work. The disciple's journey was a really difficult life at times and we read in John 6 that many of Jesus' disciples turned back and stopped following Him, mainly because they found His teaching too hard to comprehend. I'm sure some found it all too hard in other ways too and went home. We, too, at times struggle to keep on the right path when following Jesus especially if we feel tired and run down or when life throws up really painful times and it all seems too difficult.

Perhaps for us all it's good to have a spiritual check-up as well as a physical one regularly, perhaps find a trusted friend to speak to and pray with, because life on the road, our journey, with Jesus can be challenging and tiring at times. But just as with our physical health, where we often have to make lifestyle choices to keep healthy, let us make the most important lifestyle choice and follow our Lord. He knows our strengths and our weaknesses. He is there in times of sickness and health. He is with us always in all circumstances, and how good is it to know that the Holy Spirit lives within us and certainly checks up The INDWELLING on us all the time.

The members of Steeple's Parochial Church Council struggle to keep the church in good repair and the churchyard looking tidy. They are grateful for a small band of parishioners who regularly mow the grass in several parts of the churchyard and even cut the hedges periodically.

Families are responsible for maintenance of individual graves and some do this beautifully with plantings of seasonal flowers. Some graves are unkempt, perhaps because there are no family members living locally.

Unfortunately, some people ignore established rules and extend their grave into the pathways or install hard kerbs. Some spread chippings that can damage mowers. These people are about to be contacted and asked to reinstate their grave to comply with churchyard regulations. As well as our traditional Remembrance Sunday service on 12th November, the Assistant Lord Lieutenant of Essex is planning to visit Steeple Church on Armistice Day, Saturday 11th for a small ceremony during which all the names recorded on Steeple's War Memorial will be honoured at 11am. For most of them, we have a summary of their war service kept alongside the memorials in the church.
