November!

Thomas Hood

Thomas Hood's famous poem is grimly pessimistic. An unknown author claimed, "Autumn shows us how beautiful it is to let things go." Others have rejoiced in the colours of autumn leaves which as they fall, "they fly, they wander and take their time on this, their only chance to soar." Summer is definitely over and by the end of the month we'll be in winter. So what can we make of November?

More than most, November is the month of remembering, starting with All Saints' Day on the first, and All Souls on the second. As people nowadays spend small fortunes on all things frightening, ghastly and horrific for Hallowe'en on 31st October, let's remind ourselves that the name really means the "Eve of All Hallows," the day before All Saints, just as Christmas Eve is the day before Christmas Day.

On 1st November, praise God for those whose faith built the Church and changed the world, sometimes at the cost of their lives.

On 2nd November, All Souls Day, thank God for those we have loved and lost.

Four days later, on 6th November the Church remembers our own patron, St Leonard (see page 8).

Despite having just celebrated All Saints Day, the Church of England remembers the Saints and Martyrs of England on the 8th, but the chief object of remembering is, this year, the 10^{th} , as we remember how on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of 1918, the guns of the First World War fell silent. Alas, the peace lasted only 21 years, partly because the "winning" side exacted revenge rather than following lesus' command, "love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you." (Luke 6:27-28) That's difficult almost to the point of impossibility – as Jesus acknowledged, but it was echoed in the words of Martin Luther King Jr, who said in 1963, "Darkness cannot drive out darkness, only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate, only love can do that." Whether or not this was acknowledged, the treatment of Germany after the Second World War was markedly different and our former foes are our opponents only in football matches.

Throughout the month we have a countdown to two things. On the 24th we celebrate Christ the King. Jesus fled up a mountain to avoid being "made" a king. When Pontius Pilate said to Him, "So you are a king, then," He replied "My kingdom is not of this world." November ends with the challenge that Christ the King offers, to live the values of the Kingdom of God that Jesus inaugurated, not only by his teaching and healing, but on the cross-shaped throne on which he died.

The second thing, this year, is actually on Ist December, Advent Sunday, when we turn from remembering to anticipating. Advent bids us to look forward, not only to celebrating Jesus' first coming as a human baby, but also to his coming to rule hearts, minds and conduct.

No, Thomas Hood. November isn't so bad!

Our Grief Journey

One thing that is a certainty in our lives is that we will encounter grief. We will all experience loss at some time albeit in differing circumstances, and we have to learn and manage to overcome the obstacles we may come up against as we navigate our way through. Most of us want to run away from grief but we know deep down that we need to face it and often need help to do just that.

There is no right or wrong way to grieve and even though there can be differing stages we may go through like shock, denial, anger, fear or guilt. We must remember that every person's grief experience is unique to them.

We read recently about an insight into the difference between grief and mourning. It said that grief is the inward process that involves our thoughts and feelings after a loss, and mourning is the outward process that is shown in our expression of grief the: 'Grief other people see' and it may be misconstrued that people have got over a loss very quickly if they don't outwardly show it but inwardly hurt deeply.

At St. Leonard's we are holding an 8-week Bereavement Course beginning on Wednesday 20th of November from 7-8pm where people can come and be with others on their journey, no matter how now or far along that is. For som

no matter how new or far along that is. For some of us it's good to know at sad and difficult times that we aren't alone and can journey together and share memories and points of need.

St Leonard, our church's saint

We know a little of Leonard, much legend. He was a Frank, born in the late 5th century. Legend says he was a courtier to King Clovis, the first Frankish king in France. They were both converted to Christ in 496 by St Remy. Leonard became a hermit in the forest East of Limoges, where he gathered several disciples. His prayers were seen as causing miraculous healings of women in labour and the release of prisoners. Leonard is the patron saint of both groups. He died in 559AD and is celebrated on 6 November.



St Leonard's Tomb 2004

An 11th Century legend says he founded a monastery in Noblat, a village 20 kilometres from Limoges. It was renamed St Léonard-de-Noblat. Leonard is buried in the

church. Many pilgrims came to honour him. A fancy goods shop next to the church has a plaque labelled "The Legend of St Leonard". It encourages women seeking pregnancy to touch the shackles on Leonard's tomb, and leave the Saint to ensure success.

The IIth Century "Life of St Leonard" says he welcomed freed prisoners, giving them shelter and work so

they had a new start in life. There are 177 churches in England dedicated to this French hermit, a man of prayer who refused riches and served his local community. Quite a good example!

We were grateful to Michael and Jane Pudney for letting us hold the Supper in their charming barn at West Newlands. Sharing the event with friends from the Church of St Lawrence really did make it all the more enjoyable.

Now we must plan for Remembrance Sunday. This year has marked the 80th Anniversary of "D Day" and, by November 1944, our forebears were quietly confident of clearing the Nazis out of Western Europe. Our service will be at 10.30 am.


We are managing the Shoebox Collection as usual. We hope you are already involved.
