#### **Vicar's Reflection**

At the beginning of this month of October Rev'd Jacqui will be ordained priest: a tremendous occasion for us all to celebrate together. The process for getting to this point of ordination has taken *many* years of hard work and study, which Jacqui has undertaken diligently and faithfully.

The initial process of becoming a priest starts as God plants a seed, or thought, into the hearts of people to be 'set apart' for the people of God. The home church – after a period of reflection, prayer and conversation - then endorses that call and agree that the person should seek a vocation in the church. Usually, the person setting out on the path will have completed the 2-year Course in Christian Studies as well. A period of discernment is then undertaken by the diocese through the D.D.O. (Diocesan Director of Ordinands). Then, after the appropriate time of preparation, the candidate is asked to attend an interview with the Bishops Advisory Panel. When (or if) the panel agree with the call to the priesthood, it is recommended that the candidate undertakes a three-year degree course in Theology. On successful completion of the academic course, the candidate then has [usually] two to three years of practical experience, during which time they are ordained priest. It seems such a long process but one which is so very worthwhile as the true vocations start to flourish and show, especially during the practical years as Curate alongside an experienced training incumbent.

Jacqui is now one year in along the practical experience, having been 'deaconed' to the post of curate in the Southminster / Steeple Benefice, and we are so glad she has slotted into the life of the churches bringing fresh ideas and

insightful thought to our services and meetings. We are so fortunate to have her serve among us over these few years, and we look forward to her priesting on 1<sup>st</sup> October in Chelmsford.

We have an opportunity to celebrate with her as she presides at her first Communion service on 2<sup>nd</sup> October in Southminster (see page 12). This wonderful occasion will be followed by a lovely Southminster & Steeple churches family lunch all together here in St Leonard's. Arrangements for this are in hand by our Social Team and will be publicised nearer the time but make it a date in your diary now and watch/listen for further announcements nearer the time.

On that Sunday when we all celebrate Jacqui having been priested, we (Jacqui and I) will also be going over in the late afternoon to the farewell service at Chelmsford Cathedral as we say our goodbyes to Archdeacon Elizabeth; such a contrast in the day, yet under God's gift some powerful new ministries are starting.

The prophet Jeremiah announces the Word of God to the people in exile in Babylon. Promises of times in the future, with words that encourage the heart.

"10 This is what the LORD says: 11 For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the LORD, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Jer 29:10-11

This is said to people who are captured... enslaved, and have been for many years, and yet Jeremiah says, bringing them a word from God Himself "When seventy years have been completed – then I will bring you back to Jerusalem" Sometimes we need to wait a while before God can put into

place the things necessary for our future to begin. There may be lessons to learn, words to grasp, attitudes to change. These changes will continue as God moulds us into the people He would have us be; to become the people who serve Him in a fresh way. Jacqui will continue to be shaped by God so that the plans He has for her will be for His glory, living in His presence. Elizabeth will be continuing her ministry, not as Archdeacon, but as a person set apart for God; working in a new community.

Has God got plans for Jacqui and Elizabeth? Absolutely! We may not see it yet, and it may not be in our time-frame... but we can be assured that if we place ourselves into the hands of God, He will bring to fruition the things that He has planned; plans to prosper and not to harm; plans to give a future and a hope. What has God planned for you? What calling is there on your life? I do recommend you read *Joshua 14*: 6 - 15 and see how 85yr old Caleb began a new ministry under God's direction. It is a really good read, especially in the Amplified Version: there is no such thing as being 'too old' for our God to empower and use...



One example being in Matthew 28 v 20 where Jesus promises to be with us always. This is a great example of praying Scripture when Jesus told his disciples to go and make disciples

of all nations, He said "Surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age" and again in Hebrews 13 v 5 on speaking about leading a Godly life God said "I will never leave You or forsake you." #### REMEMBERING PEOPLE

I am haunted by the news a while ago of a woman who was found dead in her home after being there for something like two weeks.

This is not a follow-up to my other article about keeping an eye on neighbours, but another thought about keeping in touch with those who come into our lives - and we want them to stay there.

We form different kinds of relationships with people and the strongest friendships are not always with those who live near to us. As life goes on it's interesting to consider how people far away still keep in contact with us – not always often, not always regularly, but they stay in touch. Then there are those, often ageing, who don't make contact but if WE pick up the phone and give them a call we can tell straight away how pleased they are to hear from an old friend.

My friend Lakshmi in Kathmandu (of whom I've written before!) has now discovered WhatsApp and the internet is now up and running in Nepal (probably not everywhere but at least where she is) and so often, nowadays, with the help of a nephew, I get a video call from Lakshmi, now in her nineties. When I first knew her in the 1980s we had to rely on airmail and it was fortunate if 2 letters a year were received by either of us, but the internet has made a huge difference. After the earthquake in Nepal a few years ago, then Covid, I didn't hear much from her because of the lack of internet available, and sadly I seem to have lost touch with other families of my acquaintance over there since the earthquake. But Lakshmi is still there and makes the effort to keep in touch using modern means.

My best friend is French, lives in France, and we are in touch all the time – by which I mean several times a week. Thanks to modern technology, with WhatsApp and email, we don't have to rely any more on expensive landline calls and airmail.

Both these relationships went through times in the past when contact was more sporadic in the days before modern means to keep in touch were to hand. But clearly none of us ever forgot each other. These are just two examples — I won't even start on my huge family in Australia!! - the point being that as humans we love to keep in touch with special people around us and now it's easy to do so.

Closer to home, we often go through periods when we might see a lot of a local friend or acquaintance, and then "life gets in the way" and we get busy and we don't make contact for a while. Then when we do, we can pick up where we left off, as it were. A sign of true friendship.

Not everybody is good at keeping up – living in the moment can sometimes be time consuming. Friendships DO come and go, but the best ones live on if both parties are interested enough.

As we age and people of our generation become ill and pass away – relatives, close friends, acquaintances – don't you think it's important that we make an effort to keep up with those around us whose friendship/affection we treasure?

"Keeping the windows open towards Jerusalem"
Nicholas Henshall, Dean of Chelmsford, at Bradwell Chapel

The Dean described the deforestation of Ethiopia's once fertile highlands, now barren, and the appearance of "Hunger Stones" in Czechia as the Elbe reached record lows as warnings. He suggested that ecology and environment are fundamentally spiritual issues: "if anything is going to change, this is fundamental." People of faith aren't magically better than others, but have done extraordinary things, from abolishing the slave trade onwards.

Ecology and environment as a spiritual issue are written into our scriptures. The Old Testament Law is framed within God's act of creation. Revelation 22:2 says, "The leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations". Secondly, care for the earth is a constant theme in Christian worship. Thirdly, God in Jesus came to save not only people, but *all creation*. This talk's title refers to Daniel, a Jewish exile in Babylon, defying the king by praying three times a day "keeping the windows open towards Jerusalem". Daniel paid attention to the signs of the times, seeing where God was leading, and understanding Daniel's call. That seems to the Dean what God is calling us to in the current environmental catastrophe: - Stay faithful rather than despair; - Pay attention to the signs of the times, however uncomfortable; - Discern where God is leading and how God calls us to get involved. Do this alongside all people of good will, of all faiths and philosophies. Seek to build together resilient, outward facing communities.

The 5% of forest left in central Ethiopia is newly planted around churches. These "church forests" are signs of hope for all people. They continue to grow. Properly managed they speak of the possibility of restoration, the renewal of agriculture and the promise that we can build communities where the needs of each are met, and all can flourish together.

The work on repairing timberwork around the Steeple Church belfry is finally underway. It started mid-September and should be completed by end-November in time for our Christmas events.

While the belfry timber repairs are in progress, we are also refurbishing the ornate entrance gates and gateposts that were erected over 70 years ago as part of Steeple's thanksgiving for the end of WW2.

Steeple Historic Vehicle Gathering in August enjoyed excellent weather and raised over £2400 towards the belfry project. This was more than last year in spite of competition from another vehicle event at Mayland the same day. We received £866 as Steeple's share of proceeds from Wheels & Hooves at Burnham in July and we've recently received a very generous donation towards the belfry project from a parishioner.

We are extremely grateful to everyone who supported these fund-raising events and, of course, the hardworking volunteers who made them possible. There's still some shortfall in funding the belfry repairs project so we need successful outcomes from our grant applications by December when the bills will be due.

The Reverend Jacqui King, curate of Southminster and Steeple, and her husband Mac have helped greatly with our events this summer. We congratulate Jacqui on being ordained a priest by Bishop John at the church of St Mary & St John at Broomfield, on Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> October. There will be no service at Steeple on Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> October because we'll all be at the 10.45 am Communion service at St Leonard's, Southminster celebrating her achievement.

# Steeple's Communion Service on 11<sup>th</sup> September was adapted to become a thanksgiving for the long life and illustrious service of HM Queen Elizabeth II.

Our Harvest celebration was already arranged for the following Sunday and it was decided this should go ahead in spite of being during the period of official mourning. At the service, we were pleased to be joined by our local Deputy to the Lord Lieutenant of Essex. It was fortunate our service was at 9.15 am because he had to go on to Stansted to serve in welcoming the many heads of state flying in for the royal funeral.

#### Steeple News continued

The Book of Condolences started by Steeple Parish Council on Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> was available in Steeple Church throughout Sunday 18<sup>th</sup>. Steeple's period of mourning culminated in the National Moment of Reflection at 8pm Sunday evening in the church.

A few days after the Harvest Thanksgiving, all produce and other foodstuffs brought to the church were taken either to the Dengie Food Pantry at Southminster or to a women's refuge near Pitsea.

## Moving on with my part in the 'Demise of The Printing Industry' Harry Payne

Printing had a history, it was a Craft, at the same time I guess, rather insular. I would not say it went so far as to develop its own language, but with much of it carried down, virtually unchanged, over the centuries, its usage could seem odd to people not involved in print. In the 1950's I discovered Printing was not so far advanced from that of the 15th century. Mechanisation had arrived with the industrial revolution. Yes, there had been sophisticated machine developments to keep abreast of increasing demand for print, but much of it on existing processes.

As a newcomer I had to learn the language of printing, to understand what was meant when given instructions..... let me give you some examples. Printing measurement is unique to printing, or it used to be in days of Letterpress. It is based upon the Point System. This came out of standardisation with the American system around 1900. All rather hotchpot and complicated prior to then. Basically there are 72 points to the inch. Spacing material placed between lines or pages of type fall under the heading Furniture. That is individual pieces over 18 points wide. Under 6 points wide they would be called **Leads**, as in the metal from what they were made. They would be 1, 2, 3, or 6 points thick. At 6 points they could be made of wood or metal, they then were called **Nonpareils** or **Reglets**. The length would be varied as required and measured in **Ems**, one Em being 12 points, 6 points would be an En. With me so far? Can you imagine the confusion of someone whose only measurements in life so far, had been feet and inches. Here is

one that I could never understand or find a reason for. The height of a piece of type. It is .918 of an inch high. Every Letterpress printing machine anywhere in the world, was manufactured to print from type or blocks that were .918 of an inch high. Not that there was any connection but a shilling (old money) in diameter, was same as a piece of type was high!

The connection between type and printing machines. Let us imagine you are preparing *by hand* a page of, say this magazine. We will be using individual letters or pieces of type. The **compositor** would collect each letter from a **Typecase**, where each letter would have its predetermined slot or position in the case. Each letter would have a notch cut into its side so the compositor would know to position the letter the right way up and right way round. His thumb nail would rest in the notch as he worked.

A Composing Stick is the tool that the compositor holds while setting the page by hand. If you look at the illustration of the Stick, which is set to the line length you require, you will note the type is upside down! Not



only upside down but back to front too. Like mirror writing. So the compositor works on type, upside-down back to front. With experience a Compositor learns to read upside down mirror writing, just as quickly as someone reads the text you are reading now. He does not need to read each letter as he picks it up, for they should all have been **Dissed** back into the correct slot from a previous job.

The finished section/paragraph is placed onto a **Galley** for page **make up**, this is a metal tray where you can finish working on the page. This Galley might be placed on a **Stone**, which is not a stone at all, but an accurately machined metal bench, very solid very heavy. Alternatively the Galley could be placed on a **Random**, this is the angled area that will ordinarily hold the type case being used to hand set type. Being on the Random keeps the Galley at an angle so the type doesn't fall over if knocked. If it should be, you are left with a **Printers Pie**. When the page is complete the compositor will tightly wrap some **Page Cord** around the page which will hold all the individual pieces in place. If it is correctly tied the page can be lifted, between two fore fingers and two thumbs and moved around. Great skill is required in setting the page accurately to allow that kind of moving to be done with confidence.

To get the type onto a printing machine it has to **Locked** into a **Chase**. Furniture is placed all round the type which needs to be **planed level** Every letter has to be perfectly vertical and level, then pressure is applied on the furniture from two sides only, by the use of **Quoins**, these are tightened by **Keys**. You then have a **Forme** ready to be placed onto or into the **Bed** of the machine. On cylinder printing machines the Bed is usually flat. On platen machines the Bed is vertical. At this stage you are ready to take the first **impression**, this does not mean you are ready to start printing yet.
