Curate's Reflection

During July and August, in our Sunday services, we've been thinking about different '*Heroes of Faith*.' We've learned about the faith and courage of Daniel while in the den of lions; about David, who stood up to Goliath before becoming King of Israel; Deborah, the only female judge over Israel; of Elijah, the most famous prophet; about Joseph, sold into slavery and how his gift of interpreting dreams saved Egypt and his family from famine; of Amos, a spokesperson for justice, and, by the time you read this magazine we'll have heard about Esther, Noah and possibly Julian of Norwich too!

Each of these heroes teaches us about putting our faith in God. Faith is being confident in what we hope for, being certain and believing in what our human eyes cannot see (Hebrews 11.1), or as Martin Luther King put it, faith is taking the first step, even when you don't see the whole staircase. Christian faith is *believing and trusting in a God we cannot see*, a God who loves us throughout life's ups and downs and who listens, hears and cares. None of us can fully understand the mind of God and often struggle to speak with certainty of God's ways, but the scriptures tell us that God sees our misery, hears our cries, and knows our suffering. God saw the plight of the Israelites oppressed in Egypt, gave them hope and a future (Exodus 3.7-8), and promises to do the same for us today.

Still, it isn't always that straightforward because God doesn't always seem to answer our cries. Sometimes God seems distant, sometimes it seems as if God hasn't seen or heard us, and sometimes, we doubt that God might be at work, leaving us to guestion God and why God didn't act or intervene. However, when God sees and hears the cries of the distressed, the form God takes is that he uses us as human agents to bring about change. God acts through us; we are the heroes of faith in today's world; even when we feel we only have the tiniest and most easily shaken amount of faith, God uses us when we are reluctant or lacking faith. We become God's ears, eyes, hands and feet to share God's loving nature and wisdom. As we act for God, the wonderful thing is that our faith is restored, grows and flourishes; we are blessed as we bless others. We should always ask ourselves, was it a coincidence that we were there, or was that moment a God instance?

So, the 'Heroes of Faith' we have remembered on Sundays are people like *us*, the ones God chose and sent into places of suffering to do God's work of healing, liberating and restoring, even if they felt they

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might not have the credentials for the situation. When we remind God of our inadequacies, God says to us as he said to Moses, "*I will be with you!*" (Exodus 3.12). The work that we do is always God's work, not ours. All we are asked to do is to act by faith. Let God be our leader and guide; we are to trust in his faithfulness to us in all areas of life. (*1 Corinthians 12: 27*)

What we think, say, and do for God changes situations; we only need a little faith and God adds the rest. God acts *through us … we are all today's* heroes of faith.

The Charge of the Light Brigade

I expect many of us have heard the above-entitled poem written in 1854 by Alfred Lord Tennyson. It was written to commemorate the bravery of the British soldiers killed at the Battle of Balaclava during the Crimean war.

The battle was a sad day for England. Their light cavalry soldiers, lightly armed, mounted on horseback, were mistakenly ordered to attack a Russian artillery battery. The soldiers did their duty, they obeyed their superior's command and the 600 soldiers charged headlong into the fray, charging against Russians cannons and suffering high casualties but making no gains on the enemy's territory.

As we know the charge was a command from a superior officer which had only one response: obedience, regardless of the cost. Which leads us to thinking about the Charge, the command, given by Jesus to His Church. Jesus' great commission is to go into all the world carrying the light, the Good News, of the Gospel. Jesus' commission is to go, make disciples, baptize and teach.

The hardest part for us all is the "Go" command. With some trepidation we ask: Where will we be sent? Will we have to move house? Will our whole life change? One thing we do know is that it won't always be easy, we may endure hardship

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as a good soldier of Jesus but that is the responsibility of all who accept the charge of our Lord.

We know, as Christians, we are in a war, but not a physical war, instead we are in a spiritual war. We constantly battle against principalities and powers of evil as we seek to teach the saving grace of Jesus in our mission to this world.

So, our "Charge" is to go into all the world and preach to all peoples of repentance and then God's forgiveness, this is our life long commission. Let us shine and charge into this world as the light of Jesus always remembering we just need to trust and obey knowing that Jesus has promised He will be with us always and in all circumstances.

The Sunday evening Services at the Chapel of St Peter on the Wall in Bradwell have continued through August.

The General title was "Discrimination" and on 6th August it was **Sexual Orientation Discrimination** with a talk by Piers Northam, the Bishop's Adviser on Identity, Sexuality and Relationships.

I made lots of notes but was blessed when Piers sent me a complete paper version of his talk. I have tried to pick out the most important parts and have written them here as his statements.

We start with Acts 8: 26-38 : Philip and the Ethiopian Eunuch

Our topic today is discrimination based on sexual orientation and on sexual gender identity. The Ethiopian eunuch is someone who sits outside the norm of Jewish society, so he is "othered". He is banned from temple worship. Our secular society has moved a long way since the 1960s when homosexuality began to be decriminalised, but there are still many problems for LGBTQ+ people.

In some respects the Church has moved forward too, e.g with the "Living in Love and Faith" courses. At least the Church is more positive, or at least more honest than it used to be. One question the Church faces is "Should we be more accepting?" We are called to live distinctively and sometimes this means living counter culturally. Above all, our decisions should be grounded in our understanding and experience of God and God's call on our lives. The eunuch was reading from the script of the prophet Isaiah. He was clearly a person of faith but he had lots of questions. When Philip arrived (sent by the Holy Spirit) he offered to interpret the scriptures. This he did and went on to tell the good news of Jesus, a message brim-full of hope for all humanity including the marginalised in society. So the eunuch asked "Is there anything to prevent me from being baptised?" He is enthused by the Gospel but his question betrays a lurking fear. Such fear shows itself in three questions then and now. The Church seems often to give negative answers to "outsiders".

I Am I acceptable?	Only up to a point; you may have to		
	deny a large part of who you are.		
2 Am I good enough?	No, not entirely.		
3 Am I included?	Well, only for certain things.		

Philip baptised the eunuch, and we need to answer people's questions today in a more positive manner as well as telling them the good news of Jesus. Our answers need to be:

- I Yes because of what Christ has done for you and for all humanity
- 2 Through the grace, the mercy and the love of God, YES you are!
- 3 All of us are included for each and every one of us is a beloved child of God....All are longed for, all are welcome.
